BOY IS GOING SOUTH IS BELIEF

Ralph Parker in Albany Thursday Night Held Certain—No Fear Felt

Ralph Parker, son of J. W. Parker, 371 North Liberty street, who left home Thursday night, is believed to be bound south, possibly for California, according to the police and steps have been taken by the officers for his apprehension.

The boy was in Albany Thursday night, it has been learned as a result of communication yesterday by the police, and Mr. Parker from Chief of Police Catlin of Albany. The Parker boy was with a companion, who is believed to be older and who, it is thought, may be one of a "gang" of men who lure boys away from home to get their money and then leave them stranded. The pair cashed checks endorsed by Mr. Parker and later the police found three similar checks on the street which

had evidently fallen from the boy's pocket. The checks were the same taken from Mr. Parker's pocket on the night the boy left home. It is believed that the pair went south from Albany.

Report Floated

The idea that the Parker boy is in danger of foul play, as was indicated by a story published in an afternoon paper yesterday, is floated by both police and Mr. Parker. It is believed that the companion with whom the boy is traveling may have induced him to run away in order to get the money to which the boy gained access and which he had, but no fears are felt that he will be roughly handled or killed for the amount.

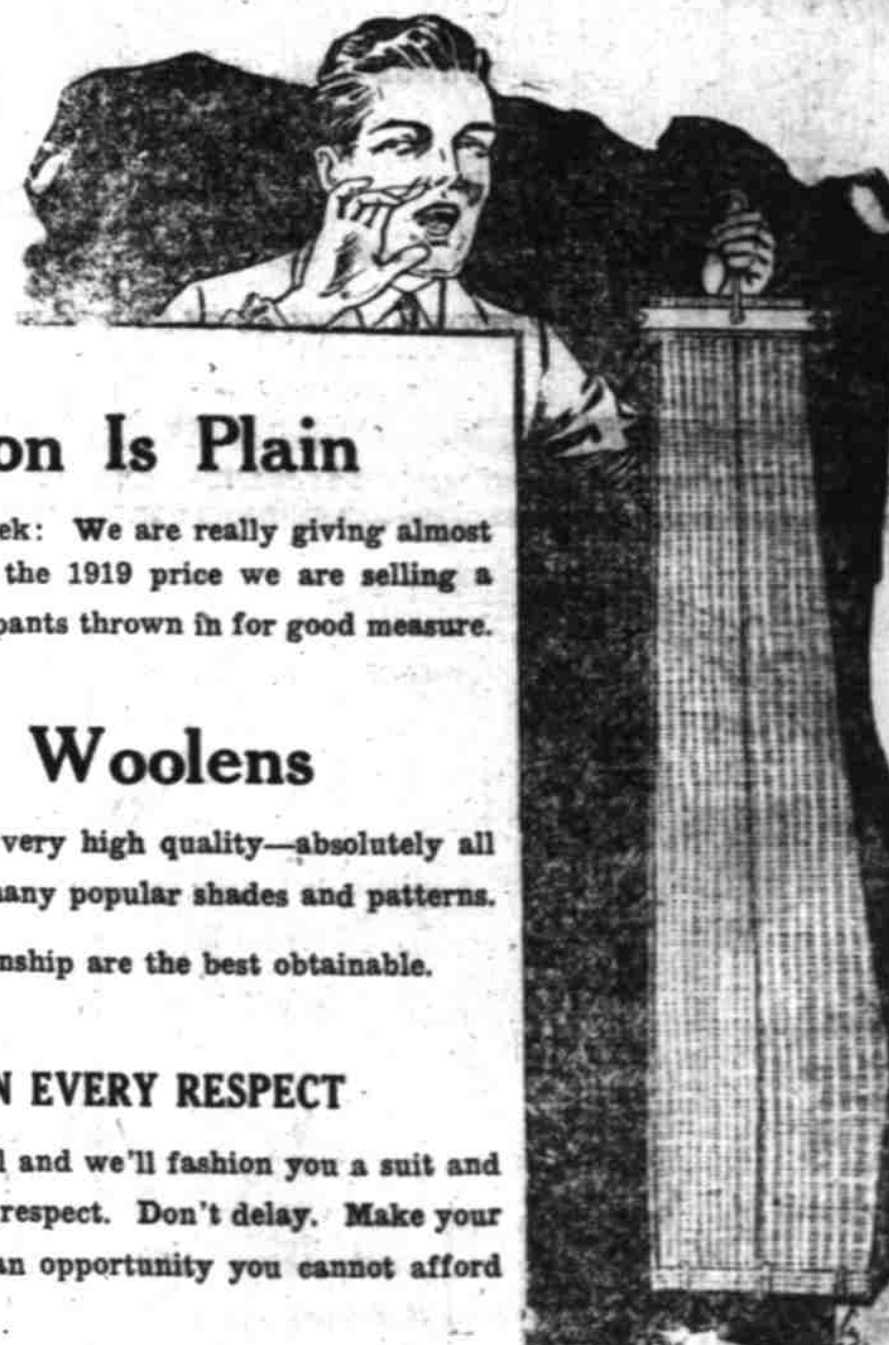

COURT DOCKET IS OUTLINED

Motions Are Heard by Judge Kelly at Sitting Friday Morning

More than 30 cases were called from the motion docket when Judge Percy R. Kelly convened in department No. 1 of circuit court Friday morning. There was also a large number of old cases called for final disposition, most of which were for damage suits and collections. Some of these were dropped for various reasons.

Many of the cases have been pending from one to five years and in disposing of them, Judge Kelly took action as follows:

Dismissal of 37 cases due to absence of final prosecution; four orders for judgment in accordance with stipulated action; two cases dismissed on non-suit motions; two cases taken under advisement; in one case a motion to strike from docket was overruled. It was ordered that attorney's in four outside cases be corresponded with relative to further action.

January 7—Frances Foley against the Southern Pacific company in action to recover money advanced and services rendered; 9 a. m., Albert Brown against Ralph Swartz, for recovery of wages; 1 p. m., Clair Richardson against Phillip Winters, action for damages as a result of auto action; 1 p. m., Mrs. A. W. Collins against Charles Palmer, action involving payment of board, change of venue from Clackamas county.

January 8—9 a. m., Charles Coglin against N. Miller, action for damages, alleged malicious prosecution; 1 p. m., Violet M. Grimm against B. Cunningham, action to recover money.
