TAX LEVY FOR YEAR 38 MILLS SAYS ASSESSOR
Portion for City of Salem Proper is 13.9 Mills Is Announced
LIMITATION IS EXCEEDED
High School Tuition to Assessed on All-But 11 Districts

The tax levy of Salem for the year 1920 amounts to 38 mills as computed by County Assessor Ben F. West. This consists of the state and county levy of 14 and nine-tenths mills, the Salem public school levy of 8 and three-tenths mills, county levy in high school districts of nine tenths mill and the tax levy of the city of Salem proper of 13 and nine-tenths mills, which in all amounts to 38 mills.

The high school tuition levy is eight tenths of a mill. This covers the expense of education of students who have to attend high schools in other districts than those in which they live. This levy of eight tenths mill will be assessed on all districts except numbers 4, 11, 15, 23, 24, 14, 73, 77, 79, 103 and 129, which all have high schools.

The general road levy which includes all property of the county except that which lies in the city limits of Salem is 4 and five-tenths mills. The state and county levy on the school districts outside of Salem is 19 and four-tenths mills and in non-high school districts is 20 and two-tenths mills.

Two Exceed Limitation. There are two departments that are in excess of the 6 per cent limitation law, which provides that the tax budget of one year shall not exceed that of the previous year more than 6 per cent. They are the state and county levy in high school districts, which is in excess to the amount of nine-tenths of a mill and the state and county levy in non-high school districts, which exceeds the limitation by one and five-tenths mills.

The 6 per cent limitation law is causing trouble in the office of Assessor West. The excess must be computed on the valuation of each piece of property in the county, so that in case a disagreement should arise over a levy on any of this property, the whole tax budget would not be annulled. This practically doubles the task and West says that it is difficult to obtain assistants that have had experience in this work.

It would add to the assurance of a comfortable winter if for the next few months we could only confine the strike fever to lawn trimmers and baseball umpires.—Portland Telegram.

REFORMATORY TO BE RECOMMENDED
Legislature Asked to Name Special Committee to Investigate Need

To convert the present state training school for boys into a reformatory for older boys and to have the state set aside 200 acres for the establishment of a training school on the cottage plan are recommendations presented to the state board of control yesterday by L. M. Gilbert, superintendent of the training school. Mr. Gilbert accompanied these with further recommendations that the special session of the legislature this month be asked to appoint a special committee to investigate the feasibility of the plan. The board of control agreed to present the recommendation to the legislature.

Mr. Gilbert holds, and it is generally considered that the state is in need of a reformatory institution where young men who are first offenders in felonious violation of the law, or older boys, should be committed, rather than to allow them in the same institution with boys of tender years who properly belong in the training school.

The board of control yesterday approved the expenditure by Dr. R. E. L. Steiner, warden of the state penitentiary, of \$1700 for equipment of better kitchen facilities at the state prison. The kitchen will be installed in the old execution chamber.

H. C. Miles of Turner presented a claim of \$490 against the state for the burning of his hay bales, and an engine while working on state ground and employing boys from the state training school last summer. He will be told to have the claim presented at the next special session of the legislature.
