**Salem's Fire Loss Ranks Second During December**  
Fire losses in Oregon outside of Portland for the month of December aggregated \$140,745, according to the monthly report of A. C. Barber, state insurance commissioner and fire marshal. The largest loss was at Klamath Falls where damage of \$40,000 is reported, and the second largest loss was partial destruction of Waller hall, Willamette university, Salem, the damage being estimated at \$25,000. The number of fires totaled 44.
