New Corporations—Articles of incorporation were filed here yesterday by the Pacific Brass & Steel foundry of Portland with a capitalization of \$30,000. The incorporators are Aaron Popick, Elmer G. Montgomery and Hugh Montgomery. Other firms filing articles yesterday were: Kimble Motor Car company, Portland; incorporators, H. F. Kimble, E. W. Kimble, Charles S. Wolfe; capitalization, \$5,000. A W. Shingle company, Brighton; incorporators, Thomas B. Watt, H. W. Aldrich, Ralph R. Dunaway; capitalization, \$25,000. Resolutions showing an increase in capitalization were filed by the Grangers' Eugene warehouse of Eugene from \$5000 to \$15,000, and by the Couch Advertising service of Portland from \$25,000 to \$75,000. Resolutions showing a decrease in capitalization from \$100,000 to \$80,000 were filed by the Texas Land & Development company, Inc., of St. Johns, Portland. Resolutions of dissolution were filed by the firm of McCarger, Bates & Lively of Portland.

Legislator is Appointed—Information has reached Salem that J. P. Johnson of Gold Beach, Curry county, has been appointed by the Curry county court to sit in the state legislature in the seat that would have been occupied by the late J. R. Stannard who died at the beginning of the session of 1919. At that session George Chenoweth was appointed in Stannard's place. Following the session Chenoweth was tried for killing George Sydnal and acquitted on a plea of insanity and committed to the state hospital for the insane. He recently was released for the reason that after arriving at the hospital he never showed indications of insanity. A member of the legislature appointed in this manner has no vote. The only way in which a bonafide member can be chosen is by special election.

Farm Workers Alone Fail to Have Pay Increased A list of wage earning occupations listed in the report of W. H. Fitzgerald, deputy state labor commissioner in charge of the Portland branch, for the last months of 1919, shows that the wages of farm hands alone have decreased since June, while the wages of all others have increased. The report is made to C. H. Gram, state labor commissioner.

The list of occupations with comparative average wages for June and December follows: Carpenters—June, \$5.60 a day; December, \$7.27 a day. Teamsters—June, \$4.31 a day; December, \$4.39 a day. Head fallers—June, \$5.82 a day; December, \$6.45 a day. Second fallers—June, \$5.38 a day; December, \$6.07 a day. Laborers—June, \$1.11 a day; December, \$1.38 a day. Camp cooks—June, \$9.88 a month and board; December, \$132 a month and board. Dishwashers—June, \$67.10 a month and board; December, \$81 a month and board. Farmhands—June, \$71.18 a month and board; December, \$59.30 a month and board. Milkers—June, \$82.63 a month and board; December, \$87.77 a month and board.

BROWN GOES IN FOR FILBERTS Gervais Loganberry Grower Prepares for Nut Culture Extensively Hon. Sam H. Brown of Gervais, who has been recognized as one of the heaviest growers of loganberries in Oregon and consequently in the world, is now embarking in a new and very promising industry, the growing of filberts, and following the custom which has brought him success, in his other lines, he is proceeding scientifically. Mr. Brown was in Salem yesterday and took home with him a sufficient number of filbert trees to plant 30 acres, the trees and the plan of the planting being furnished by Percy Brothers, horticulturists, of this city, who prescribed the number and the manner of setting with regard to proper pollenization, which is an important matter with filberts as with many other varieties of orchard growth. The main variety is the Barcelona, which is the recognized commercial filbert for this section and these are accompanied by a proper proportion of other varieties for pollenizing. This is probably the largest order for filbert trees ever filled in Oregon and is but a beginning in what promises to be one of the most important branches of nut cult in western Oregon.
