IRISH PREACHER TO APPEAR HERE

Rev. S. J. Reid Will Conduct Series of Meetings at Baptist Church

An artist by profession, and a preacher of considerable note, and a preacher of outstanding ability is the Rev. S. J. Reid of Belfast, Ireland, who comes to the First Baptist church Sunday for a series of evangelistic meetings. Dr. Reid has had an interesting career in the ministry and at one time served as president of the Baptist Union of Ireland.

Born in Belfast, Ireland, he received most of his education in the Ulster metropolis. He took his university work in connection with the Royal University of Ireland, the headquarters of which was in Dublin. He studied for the ministry at the Presbyterian Assembly college in Bel-

fast, and also along the lines outlined by the Baptist Union Examiners of Great Britain.

Dr. Reid's first charge was the Shankhill Road Baptist church in the west end of Belfast. When he went to this congregation they numbered only 39 people and the church services were held in a school room. The work grew rapidly and in a few years there was a large membership and a beautiful church building. He remained there seven years. It was while there that he became the editor of the Irish Baptist Magazine, and also undertook other literary work. He won for him considerable recognition in fact, his writings attracted the attention of leading men of the denomination in North America and he was invited out to this country to undertake a lecture tour. He spent three months in the United States speaking in most of the large cities. It was while here he was invited to deliver a special course of lectures at the Palacios Convention of Texas on John Bunyan. Dr. Reid is considered an authority on the author of "Pilgrim's Progress" and has written a book on the "Immortal Allegory," which is now going into its second edition. Dr. Reid came out to America again and has since preached and held evangelistic campaigns in many of the largest churches of all denominations in America. He was located in Minneapolis, Minn., in 1915, where he became associate pastor to Rev. W. B. Riley of the First Baptist church, one of the greatest churches in America. He remained there until October of 1915, when he went to Winnipeg.

John W. Troy of Chicago, who accompanies Dr. Reid is a very gifted singer and choir leader. He is already in the city. He is a graduate of music of the Moody Bible Institute. All the requisites for success in the leadership of the gospel in song are his. He possesses great charm of personality, can just all the elements of a big choir and bring out the best in each and all in a way inspiring to see. He is gifted with a fine tenor, which is cultivated and used to great power in the ministry of song. He has been associated with some of the most prominent evangelists and pastors in the United States.

Bill Asks Legislature to Pass Law Enabling Them to Swear Taxpayers

Based on an argument that county assessors of Oregon will be much handicapped by a recent opinion of the supreme court holding that assessors and their deputies do not have the right to administer oaths, the assessors will, at the special session of the legislature have a bill introduced delegating to them that

right, it will carry the emergency clause.

Heretofore, assessors and their deputies have assumed the right to administer oaths. Recently, however, the assessor of Wallawa county instituted suit against a taxpayer for perjury. The defendant won in the lower court and the supreme court affirmed the decree in which it was brought out that under the law oaths cannot be administered by these officials.

Unless the assessors have the right, it is declared, that taxpayers may use their own discretion about giving a correct statement of their property and might appear before the county equalization boards even as swear off all their property listed to the assessor in making up the roll.

Ben F. West, assessor of Marion county and secretary of the Oregon assessors, has had Attorney General Brown prepare the bill.
