KEELEY WANTS TIME EXTENDED
Lawyer Under Fire Asks Permit to Practice Pending Investigation

Pending investigation of his professional and personal record asked by the State Bar association relative to the privilege of practicing law permanently in Oregon after expiration of his probation period, Lee Roy E. Keeley of Portland has filed a request with the supreme court to have his probation extended pending the investigation. His time expired December 28, and no action has yet been taken on his request.

Keeley was granted a permit to practice extending over a probationary period of nine months, a custom followed by the supreme court in regard to applicants coming to Oregon from other states where they have practiced the legal profession.

Keeley asked for a hearing and the fixing of a date for this is in the hands of the board of law examiners. The date has not been set.

Keeley got into the limelight when he questioned methods used in application of the workmen's compensation act by the state industrial accident commission. This led to an investigation of the commission by a committee specially appointed by Governor Olcott at the request of W. A. Marshall, a member of the commission. A report on this investigation is expected today, the committee now being in final session in Salem.

SUPPLIES FOR SOLONS LISTED

Mr. Kozer Will See That All Members of Session Are Equipped

Because of the short period between the proclamation of Governor Olcott, calling a special session of the legislature and the date of the opening of the session, it has not been possible to arrange the number of committee rooms usually arranged for a regular session. A letter that will be found on the desk of each member of the session Monday morning will explain, however, that accommodations have been furnished by commandeering space in some of the office apartments of the capitol.

Following is a list of supplies that will be furnished each member by Sam A. Kozer, deputy secretary of state:

One hundred printed letter heads; 50 legal size envelopes, printed; 50 letter size envelopes, printed; 25 legal size envelopes, plain; 25 letter size envelopes, plain; 1 board clip with 1 qr. legal cap, 1 qr. tools cap; 25 sheets plain letter paper; 1 expansion letter file for filing correspondence, etc.; 1 desk pad with blotter; 1 inkstand, metal base, with ink; 1 bottle mucilage, with brush; 1 package of blotters; 2 bull dog clips, for holding senate and house bills; 2 penholders; 1 package assorted pens; 3 lead pencils; 1 rubber eraser; 1 package assorted rubber bands; 1 box paper clips; 2 pyramid pins; 1 copy of rules; 1 seating arrangement senate and house; 1 carton of paper drinking cups.

Highway Commission to Receive Proposals on Spans Next Meeting
