CRITICISM MADE OF GAME COMMISSION

Impossible task of keeping two sets of cost on the same species of fish at Bonneville and produce more accurate cost to both departments.

Mr. Roberts remarks that this might be equivalent to a transfer of funds from one department to another, hence not legal, and in such case suggests that the law be amended to make it legal.

The accountant thinks it probable that charges for operating the fish car may not have been properly distributed between the game and salmon funds.

"This is a matter that cannot be clearly determined from the vouchers," he says, "and except in a few instances the charges appear to be all right as shown by the payments as most of the time the fish car is operated for the game department in distributing trout, and of course

should be paid by this department, but at other times it has been used in the interest of salmon. In order to obviate complications in handling charges for the operation of the fish car in the future, I would suggest that it be operated entirely separate from either department, under the management of someone who shall not be responsible to either the master fish warden or the state game warden, but who shall report and be entirely under the direction of the commission or commissions."

Commission Rebuked

This system, the accountant believes, would produce better results in the shipment of fish.

The commission is rebuked for the lack of care given the fish car.

"The care of the fish car during the season of the year when it is not in use," the report says, "is another thing which I believe has not been given proper attention. This car represents an investment on the part of the state of somewhere near \$7000, and could not be replaced

under present cost of labor and material, under \$9500, yet during a large part of the year in the winter time when the weather is severe, subject to extreme cold and frequent changes, the car stands out in the open weather at Bonneville, when it might as easily be sent down to the railroad yards in Portland and stored under cover."

Commenting on the care of tools the report remarks that "tools of all varieties which are in use at the Bonneville plant are handled in a careless and indifferent manner and there is no counting system to see that employees return to a central tool house all tools which are entrusted to their care. Two gasoline engines which are in very good condition as far as use is concerned are standing out in the weather instead of being placed inside."

Bonneville Needs Manager

A numbering system is recommended. Mr. Roberts believes better results could be obtained by having a manager in charge at Bonneville.

directly under Fish Warden Clanton, leaving the latter free for the larger responsibilities of handling the propagation at Bonneville and at other plants.

Concerning money handled through the commission office the reports say:

"All moneys received for licenses and other purposes by the local office of the commission have been properly accounted for and remitted to the state treasurer, and all disbursements have been checked and the balance verified, with the balance carried by the secretary of state, and all receipts and disbursements checked into the state treasurer's records kept with the game fund, hatchery district No. 1 and hatchery district No. 2 fund. Also all disbursements from special appropriations for the period from December 1, 1918, to November 30, 1919."

Comments on Revolving Fund Relative to money handled by the secretary, the following comment is made:

"Trappers' licenses, fines, sales of confiscated property, etc. handled by the secretary to the commission are deposited in the emergency revolving fund at the time received, and employed by the game warden as part of his fund, and at times have not been transmitted to the state treasurer at the close of each month. In this revolving fund is an item of \$234.14, being the proceeds of sale of game farm property, and has been allowed to remain in this fund and has not been reported and paid to the state treasurer, as provided by law, within 30 days after the receipt. This emergency fund belongs to the game department, but some hatchery moneys are deposited and paid out through it for convenience. Cash deposits put up for bonds and licenses in hatchery funds, are used in some instances in the local office of the commission for longer periods than the end of the calendar month."

Farm Contracts Defective On the subject of the game farm the report comments at length.

After mentioning indefinite contracts with Gene M. Simpson, manager of the farm, the report says in part:

"It is apparent from the correspondence and lack of definite contracts in regard to the operation of the game farm that the fault of administration lies largely with the commission, as if definite contracts had been made with the game warden, the office of the commission would have been able to have kept the record of administration and operation and made more definite settlements with Mr. Simpson so that an accounting covering each year might be made and their figures on it verified."

Game Birds Decrease

Figures in the report show a remarkable decrease in the last four years relative to birds raised and liberated each year at the state game farm, until the number for 1919 was only 36.

Figures for the last eight years follow: 1912, 3426; 1913, 345; 1914, 2234; 1915, 3786; 1916, 2772; 1917, 20; 1918, 1585; 1919, 36.

Turning to the public accusations against the commission referring to the charge that the game warden's expenses for 1918 increased three fold, the following figures are submitted as his expenses from 1915: 1915, \$403.54; 1916, \$811.56; 1917, \$655.69; 1918, \$2192.06; 1919, \$1100. Relative to the expense account or 1919 the report remarks: "Game fund only. Expenses paid from other funds not included."

Referring to the allegation that cans containing trout fry have been sent about half filled and charged on distribution records as filled cans, the report says it is possible this has happened at times, but in the opinion of the examiner it has been due to negligence of employees in filling the cans, and not to the malicious intent of any one person.

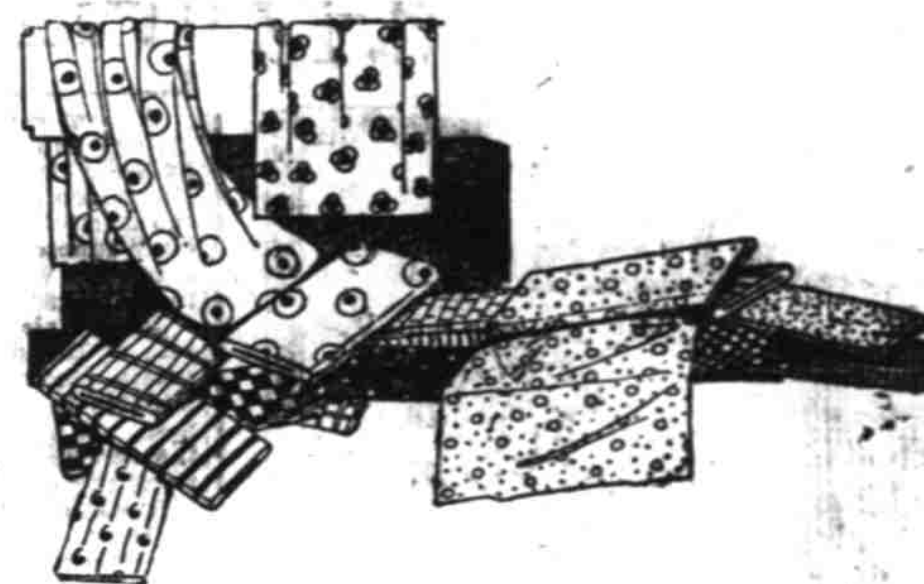

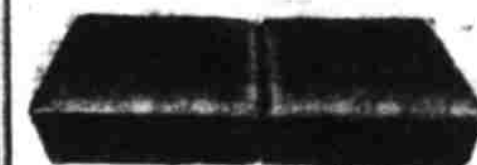
