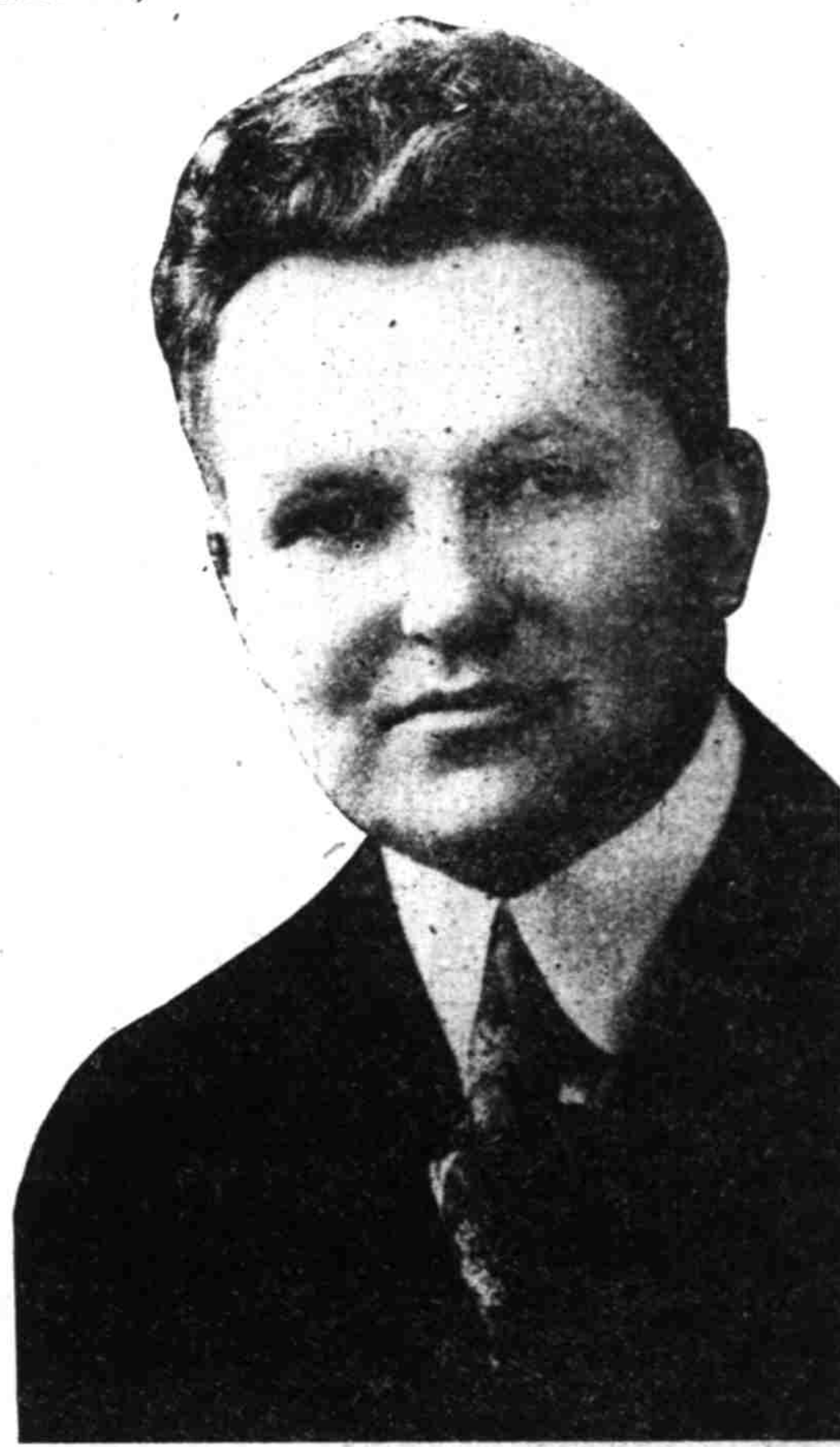
Mrs. M. J. Morris has been visiting during the week with Mrs. L. M. Barzes in Turner.

Undoubtedly the biggest event of this week will be the Apollo club's first concert of its third season. The chances for the "standing room only" sign being put into use at the armory next Tuesday night would appear to be good, judging from the line which awaited the opening of the box office for seat reservations yesterday morning.

The ensemble singing of the Apollo club, under the direction of John W. Todd, always elicits much praise and admiration, and, supplementing an unusually attractive program by the club, will be the singing of John Hand, the new American tenor.

In Seattle, where Mr. Hand sang with the Norwegian Male chorus in a Tuesday evening concert, the audience appears to have given him a great ovation. The Seattle Times, in commenting upon the concert credits Mr. Hand with having a voice of great power and beauty, "thrilling an audience that nearly filled the large auditorium of the Masonic temple, and displaying a dramatic tenor of rare quality and clear as a sparkling stream. La Ver Jensen, pianist and accompanist for Mr. Hand was recalled after a brilliant performance of Moskovsky's familiar "Waltz in E Major." The artistry of Mr. Hand is shown to splendid advantage in his singing of such familiar and favorite English songs as "Twilight Dreams," "Crying of Water," "For You Alone," "Mother O'Mine," "If Flowers Could Speak," "When Irish Eyes Are Smiling," "Lassie O'Mine," and "I Hear You Calling Me."
