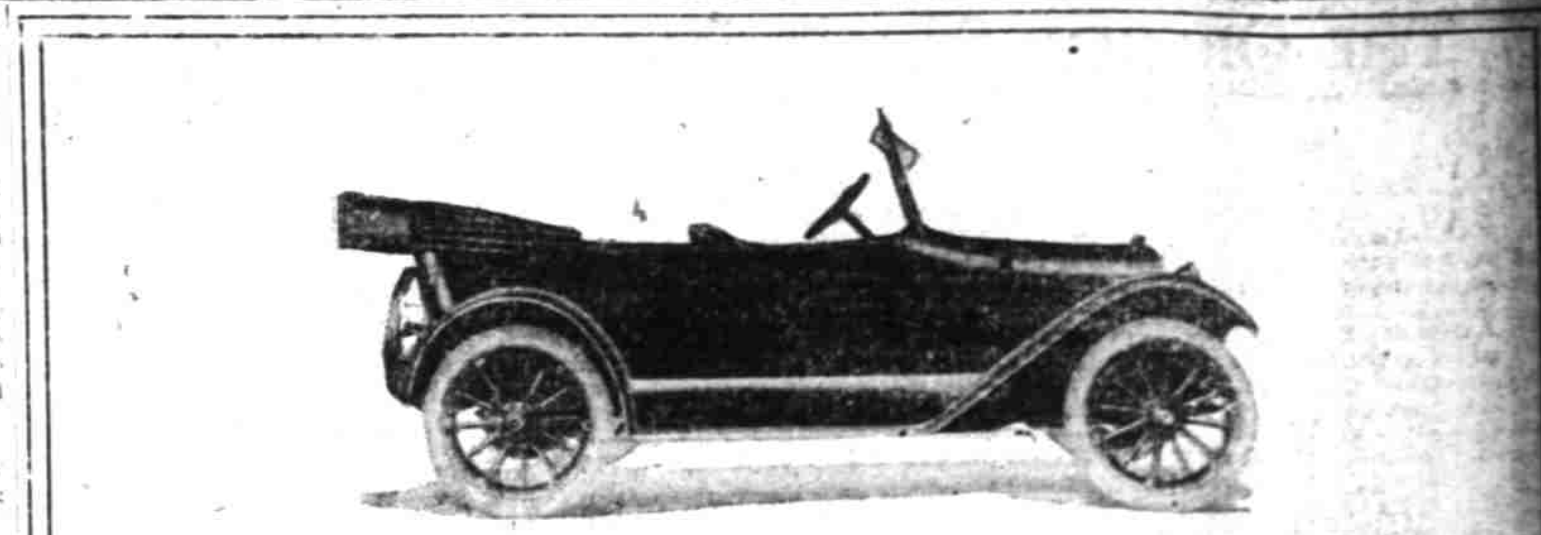
### Changes in Administration of Accident Commission Noted in Findings

days to ascertain if payments have been speeded up.

The report does not attempt to whitewash the commission for the system used in the past, neither is any condemnation embodied in the report.

Relative to the famous Dibern case out of which the investigation arose the report says the commission's award to Mrs. Dibern was probably extra-legal, but that the money reached the right parties, and no censures is heaped on the officials for their action.

The investigation has been carried on by a specially appointed committee appointed by Governor Olcott soon after he became governor.

**Committee Recommended.**

One recommendation of the investigators is that the governor appoint a committee of three members representing respectively the public, the employers and the employees, to meet semi-annually in January and July, for the purpose of going over the administration of the law by the commission and to hear and investigate complaints and make such recommendations as may be deemed advisable and to report to him. The investigators believe that this committee should serve without compensation but should be furnished with travel and subsistence expense while attending meetings.

Another recommendation is that an educational service be instituted so that workmen and employer may understand how to use the law and what their rights and responsibilities are under the law. It is recommended that this education be carried on by means of placards, posters, pamphlets and paid lectures.

"We believe," says the report, "that such service may be instituted without change in the law, but if necessary to make it effective the law should be changed."

**Publicity is Urged.**

Further the report says: "It is of vital interest to the proper functioning of the workmen's compensation fund that contributions thereto be made promptly. It is also of vital interest to the workmen that

he shall know when the concern which employs him is in default thereunder such circumstances he has the right of suit. The elimination of delinquent accounts would have an undoubted salutary effect, and such elimination can be accomplished if delinquency is given publicity. Wherefore, in order that the employees have any concern that is under the commission act may know whether their employer is in good standing, we recommend that the commission in either event shall supply the employer with a certificate bearing evidence of his standing, which shall be sent to such employer every month, and be posted by him in a conspicuous place in his plant for the information of his employees."
