## INDEMNITY BILL IS NOT OPPOSED

### Porter's Act Would Compensate Stock Owners for Slaughtered Animals

Senator Porter's bill providing for indemnity payment by the state to owners of cattle infected with tuberculosis and horses infected with anthrax, that were killed by orders of the livestock sanitary board in 1917 and 1918 were passed. The amount of money necessary is \$2926. The line is sharply drawn against disloyal aliens in senate bill No. 28 by Eberhard, which passed yesterday. It prohibits the employment on public works of aliens who claimed exemption from military service during the recent war on grounds that they were not citizens of the United States. The law will apply regardless of whether the aliens have declared their intention to become citizens. A penalty is attached for violation either by the alien or the person who employs him.

## LIBRARY LOSS FIXED AT \$4877

### Damages Allowed on 803 Books—Hours During Repair Work Announced

The fire which damaged the public library on January 4 has been adjusted by the agents of the insurance companies, at a total of \$4877.51. Of this amount \$2622.91 is allowed on books, furniture and fixtures, \$2225 was allowed on the building. Damages were allowed on 803 volumes, partial or total losses, besides the general depreciation on the whole stock of books. Hours Announced  
The plan of the board is to repair

the damage as rapidly as possible, that the public may not be unnecessarily deprived of the use of the books. During the time of repairing the library will be open for circulation books, just as long as is practical, during the hours 1 p. m. to 6 p. m. and 7 p. m. to 9 p. m. These hours will be subject to change when necessity demands it, but the notices of change will be given to the newspapers as soon as known by the librarian.

**Acceleration Work Hampered**  
With the building in its present condition, and the reference books out of repair, it is impossible for the usual reference work to be carried on. The room cannot be kept comfortable or quiet for study, but any questions that are brought to the desk will be answered as fully as conditions permit.

### Corporation Properties Are Subject to Attachment

The senate yesterday passed senate bill No. 34, introduced by Moser, and making the Oregon property of foreign corporations subject to attachments in Oregon courts. Norblad's bill No. 18, amending the code relative to the powers of municipal corporations designated as "ports" was passed. The bill allows ports to increase their limit of indebtedness from 10 per cent to 15 per cent and also allows the port of Astoria to bond itself for the purchase of a site to turn over to the government for a proposed naval base at Astoria.
