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## COOK GOING TO SESSION

Salem Scout Executive to Attend Big Round-up at Berkeley

Leaders of the Boy Scouts of America, including all Scout commissioners and Scout executives of cities west of the Mississippi river, and men of altruistic makeup will meet in a great western conference at Berkeley, Calif., during the following week, at which Salem will be represented by the local scout executive, Harold L. Cook.

It is the aim of the local Boy Scout council to bring to the door of Salem's boy life, a program fourfold in its development, and for this season Salem's chief Scout will attend the conference in an attempt to gain a working knowledge of council methods and programs.

In attendance at this round-up will be the chief scout executive, James E. West, of New York City, to which King George of England has awarded a special invitation to visit Buckingham palace with American Scouts this summer. Also Daniel Carter Beard, chief Scout commissioner, and James A. Wilder, chief sea Scout. Headquarters of the conference will be located at Hotel Claremont, on the edge of the Berkeley hills, California, where the entire history has been reserved for the use of Scout leaders.

The conference program includes practical demonstrations of Boy Scout activities, staged in San Francisco's Greek theater by 2500 of California Scouts. Also examinations in Scout requirements by all the executives in attendance, conducted by the chief scout commissioner.

The conference dates from January 20 to 23, inclusive, and in order to be present on the kickoff, northwestern Scout leaders will leave Salem in their special car on an evening train.

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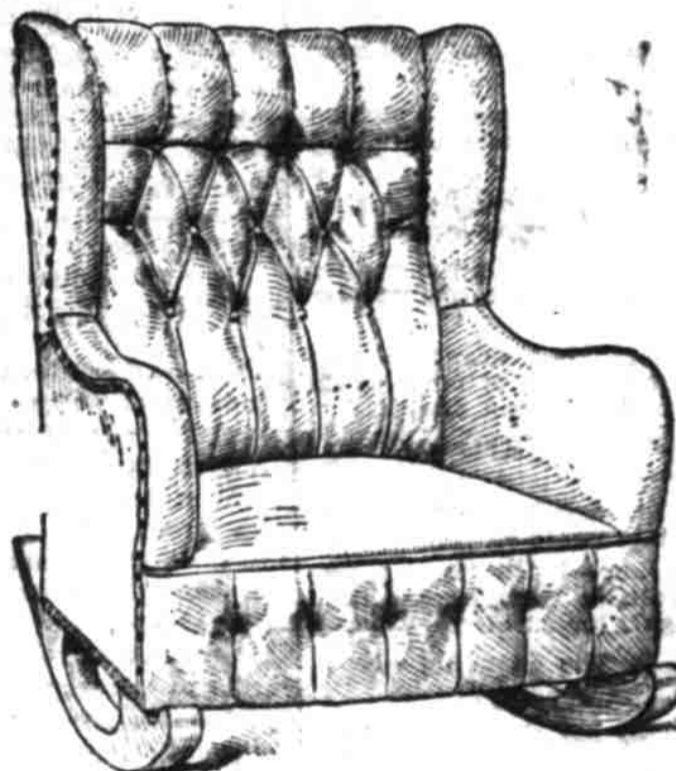
