NINETY-SEVEN BILLS ARE PASSED BY SPECIAL SESSION OF THE OREGON STATE LEGISLATURE

During the special session of the state legislature which closed early Sunday morning 97 bills were passed—44 senate bills and 53 house bills. For the special election of May 21 nine measures are referred to the people. The complete list of measures passed is given below:
