

## BOY SCOUTS TO LEARN OF SEAS

Youth To Be Trained in Arts of Navy If Motion Is Approved

BERKELEY, Cal., Jan. 22.—Formation of sea scout patrols as branch organizations of the Boy Scouts in the western states was urged today by James E. West, national scout executive, at the western roundup of the national council of scout executives.

He said the patrols were in existence in many places in the east and that the navy department, in promising cooperation with the movement, had offered to lend equipment.

West stated that he hoped every Boy Scout could become a "cabin boy," the lowest office in the scout

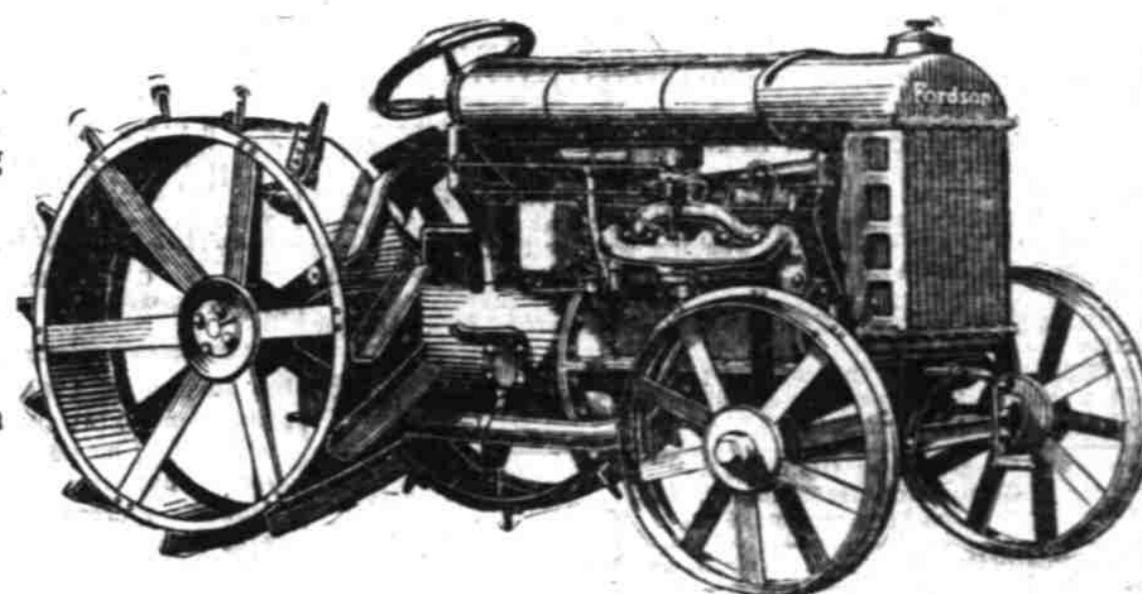

## WILDER ACCUSES STATE WITNESS

Defendant in Murder Trial Says Charles Jones Killed Bert McNeese

PENDLETON, Jan. 22.—Accusation of Charles Jones, the state's chief witness, by W. W. Wilder as the real slayer of Bert McNeese, Freezone soldier for whose murder Wilder is on trial, provided something of a sensation in the trial today.

Jones was called by the state as an eye witness to the crime. It is his story that after the three had been drinking Wilder shot McNeese, firing two shots from a revolver, and saying something to the effect that "no man can steal \$80 from me and get away with it." Jones claims to have grabbed Wilder's arm and made him drop the pistol. The weapon was identified as one which had been loaned to Wilder. Wilder, however, made the statement that it was Jones who did the shooting.

Wilder claims that an alleged confession was made to stop the sheriff's third degree. Jones is 39 years old, married and the father of five children.

## CRUELTY LAID TO "ROCK" HEAD

Colonel R. D. Johnson of Alcatraz Accused of Using Iron Torture Chambers

NEW YORK, Jan. 22.—Charges that iron torture chambers have been introduced by Colonel R. D. Johnson, executive officer at Alcatraz island, San Francisco, in which conscientious objectors of the "absolute" type, imprisoned on the island, are placed, were contained in a statement issued here tonight by the national civil liberties bureau. Albert de Silver, director of the bureau, has left for Washington, it was stated, to place the matter before Secretary of War Baker.

Robert Simmons, serving a ten year sentence as a conscientious objector, after being kept in solitary confinement, has been "transferred to the latest torture device, in which he is at present kept," the statement declared. He is "unable to sit down. He down, or fully stand; it is practically an iron straight-jacket into which the prisoner is squeezed."

"The dimensions of this torture chamber are six feet high, 23 inches in length and one foot broad. It is absolutely dark inside, the only air obtainable being from the top of the cage."

## FLOWER SHOW OUTLOOK GOOD

Exhibits to Be in Charge of Portland Floral Society

Floral exhibits at the state fair of 1920 will be in charge of the Portland Floral society and prizes will total the largest amount in the history of the fair, according to C. B. Clancey, who attended a meeting of the society Tuesday. Mr. Clancey states that the flower fanciers of the lower Willamette valley are planning to show in force at the fair and the prospects at present are for a floral section exceeding even that of last year, which is conceded to have set the high mark to that time.

## TRAINMEN WANT 40 PERCENT RISE

Officers Say Reasonable Time Has Elapsed Without Remedial Action

CLEVELAND, O., Jan. 22.—The rosterhood of Railroad Trainmen which has a membership of approximately 200,000 will ask the railroad administration Tuesday for a definite answer to its demands for a general wage increase of about 40 per cent.

William G. Lee, president of the brotherhood, today asked Director General Hines to run appointment for Tuesday and called the 22 general executive committee chairman and grand lodge officers to meet in Washington then.

The demands were presented July 31, 1919. President Wilson requested the men to wait a "reasonable time" until the government had an opportunity to reduce the cost of living.

"The men are pressing us too hard," Mr. Lee said today. "A reasonable time has elapsed and the cost of living gone up."

## Cannery for Dallas Is Secured by Association

DALLAS, Or., Jan. 22.—(Special to The Statesman.)—After many years of ardent endeavor the Dallas Commercial club at last has secured a cannery for the city, papers for the concern having been signed by the directors of the Commercial club and a Mr. Newton of Silverton this week.

The cannery is to be located in the old Barham warehouse near the Dallas public school property in the south part of the city, a two years' lease having been taken by Mr. Newton on the building. The cannery people think that by the time their lease expired they will know definitely whether a cannery will pay here and can then construct a building more suitable for their purposes.

Many acres of berries of all kinds will be planted out in this vicinity this spring and a campaign will be carried on by the Commercial club in an endeavor to interest farmers and fruitgrowers in cultivating crops that can be handled by the concern.

The cannery people obtain possession of the building February 1 and will at once begin the remodeling of the structure and the installing of machinery in order to have the place ready for operation with the coming on of the first berry crops. No vegetables, outside of possibly beans, will be canned in Dallas as competition with eastern markets is so great that it scarcely pays to handle the smaller vegetables.

## Two Alleged to Have Defied Order to Stop I. W. W. Moves

SPOKANE, Wash., Jan. 22.—Carl Haug and Elmer Sarricain, alleged members of the I. W. W. were sentenced 30 days in jail in superior court here today when they were found guilty of contempt of court in violating a permanent injunction issued recently forbidding participation in I. W. W. activities. They are the first persons arrested on charges of violating the injunction.

## Arrangements Made for Big Loan by Dutch to Germany

THE HAGUE, Jan. 22.—The foreign minister announces officially

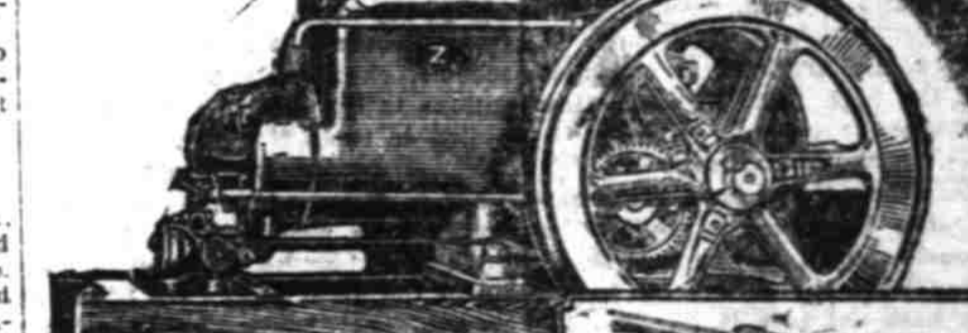
that arrangements have been made by Holland for a loan to Germany of 200,000,000 florins. The loan will be for ten years and may be renewed. It is based on coal security with the stipulation that sixty million florins are to be spent in Holland or the Dutch West Indies.
