Van Dalsem Returns from Convention at Oakland

Newton Van Dalsem, Oregon director of vocational education, has returned from Oakland, Calif., where he attended a conference of two weeks of state and federal officials, particularly state officials, who are concerned with teachers' training in trades and industries.

The central figure at the conference, says Mr. Van Dalsem, was Charles R. Allen, a federal agent for teachers' training. Before the war and before the passage of the Smith-Hughes act, Mr. Allen was a Massachusetts state official in charge of the training of teachers for trades

and industries. During the war he was engaged by the shipping board to work out the details of the instructor training scheme. After the armistice was signed he went with the federal board for vocational education.

In the conference at Oakland Mr. Allen took up three principal themes, teacher training, foreman training, and trade and industry surveys for local communities.

During the war Mr. Van Dalsem was in the shipyards as one of Mr. Allen's assistants, and is now putting into operation in Oregon the same scheme of teacher training advocated by Mr. Allen.
