KOSER LISTS BILLS GOING UPON BALLOT

Order in Which Measures Appear Shown by Deputy Secretary of State

BALLOT TITLES FORMING

One Piece of Legislation of Previous Session to Be Voted On

The nine measures that are to go on the ballot at the special election on May 21 have been listed by Sam A. Koser, deputy secretary of state, in the order in which they will appear on the ballot. Attorney General Brown, as directed by law, is now at work preparing proper ballot titles for the several proposed constitutional amendments and measures.

"Under the terms of house bill 40, providing for the special election," said Mr. Koser, "affirmative or negative arguments, whether submitted by the legislative committees or by other persons or organizations, must be filed with the secretary of state not later than March 1, 1920. This is the first time that any measure which in its ordinary course would have been referred to the people at the next ensuing regular biennial election, is by direction of the legislature taken out of such order and referred to the people at a special election as is the case with the measure which will appear first on the official ballots for the special election, relating to eminent domain over roads and ways."

The bill here referred to by Mr. Koser is senate joint resolution No. 17 of the regular session for 1919 which inadvertently was left off the ballot at the special election last June in the act of the 1919 session calling that election. The bill will appear first on the ballot in May. It proposes to amend section 18, article I of the constitution to declare that the use of all roads and ways requisite for the transportation of the raw products of mine, farm and forest is a public use and necessary to the development of the welfare of the state.

The other eight measures will appear in the following order:

House joint resolution No. 11—Amending section 7 of article XI of the constitution of the state of Oregon, relating to the lending of the credit of the state and limiting the power of contracting indebtedness.

Senate joint resolution No. 9—Repealing section 36 of article I of the constitution of the state of Oregon, abolishing the death penalty, and adding to said article I, a section to be designated as section 27, article I, providing a penalty for murder in the first degree, and also adding to said article I, a section to be designated as section 38, article I, reviving the laws abrogated and repealed as in conflict with said section 36, article I.

House joint resolution No. 7—Amending section 10 of article XXI of the constitution of the state of Oregon, relating to debts and liabilities of counties.

Senate joint resolution No. 10—Amending section 8 of article V of the constitution of the state of Oregon, relating to the office of governor.

House bill No. 86—An act to provide additional revenue for Oregon Agricultural college, University of Oregon, and Oregon State Normal school.

Senate bill No. 40—An act providing for an additional levy of two-tenths of one mill on the dollar of taxable property of the state of Oregon to be used for financial aid to honorably discharged soldiers, sailors and marines who desire to pursue a course of study, etc.

Mankind is Not Wholly to Blame for Defective Sight.

Growers' Cooperative association of which he is the manager.

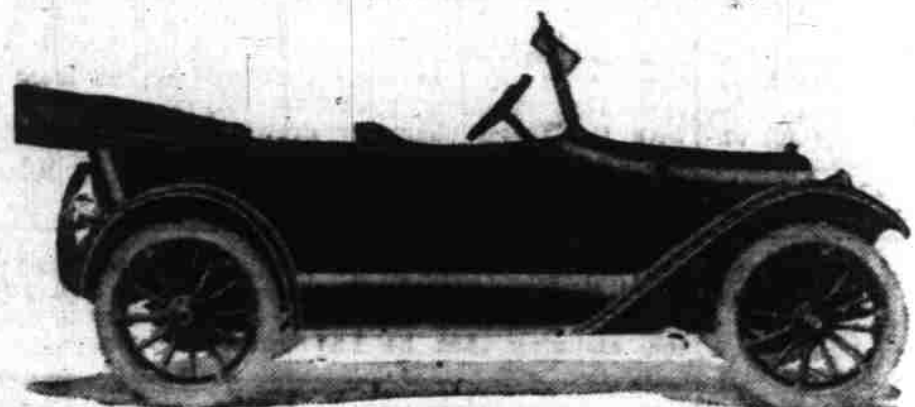
About 120 fruit men were present and so well were the proposed marketing plans received that many signed up for their full acreage.

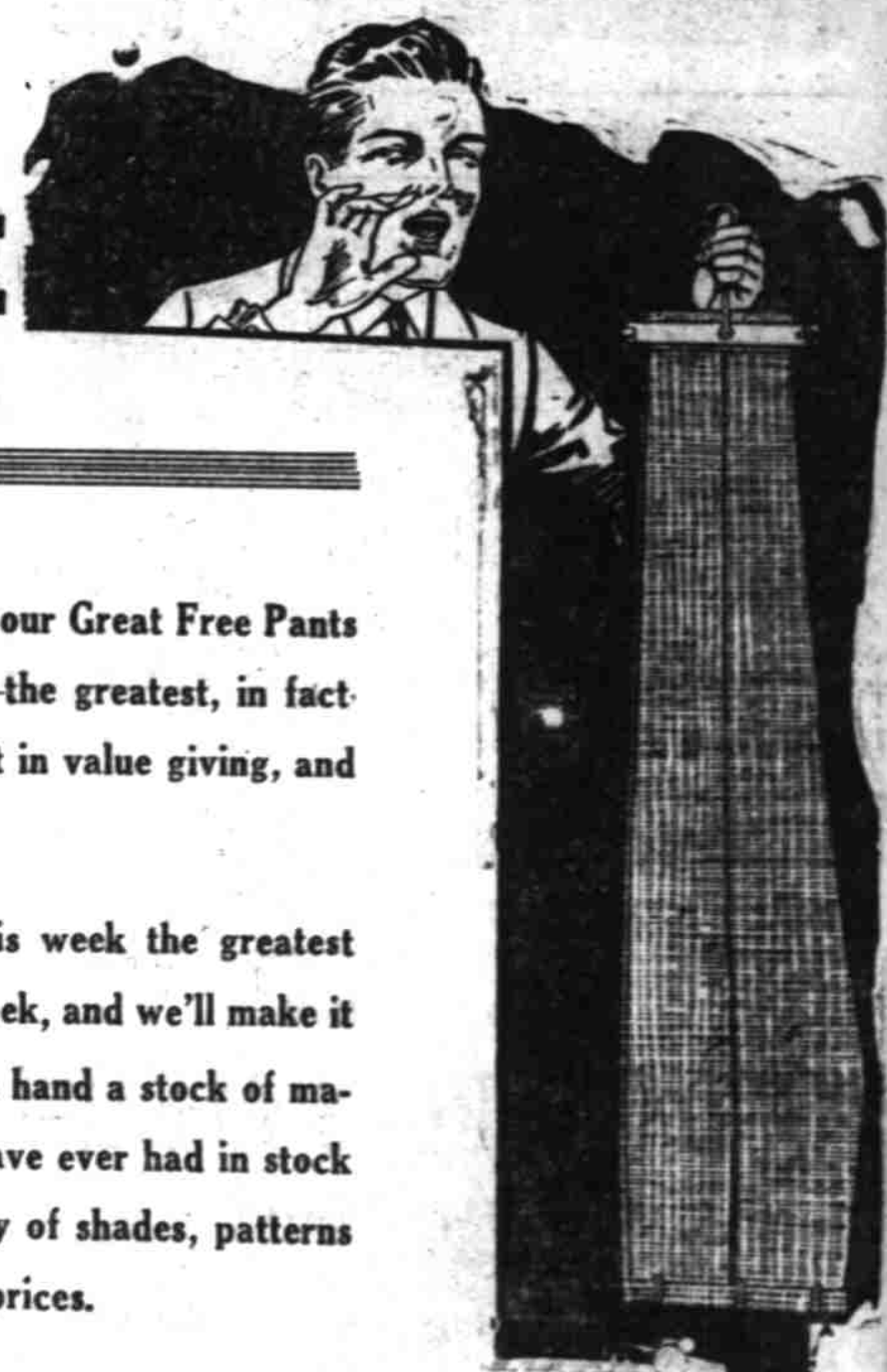
