Improper Addresses Bother—

Improper addressing third class mail matter often results in non-delivery, according to a notice sent to the Salem postoffice from Washington, D. C. This is called to the attention of mail order houses and other firms that use the mails for extensive advertising. This mail is classed as third class mail matter and is not entitled to the same delivery regulations that the first class mail is. The notice says that a large part of the improper addressing is caused by having the mail addressed on a contract basis. In this way the contractor uses the shortest address possible. For example, the address is E. Allen. The postoffice re-

Higginbotham Salem Man—

Russell Higginbotham, 25, a former resident of Salem, is held under bond of \$5000 in the Multnomah county jail at Portland for alleged participation in a number of robberies and hold-ups that have occurred in Portland recently, according to a communication received from Portland Monday. Higginbotham was arrested last week with Charles Langdale and Robert Wall by detectives who surrounded their rhabitat. It was alleged that Higginbotham has confessed two of the hold-ups. He and Langdale were bound over to the grand jury by Municipal Judge Rossman Saturday. It was claimed that Higginbotham was last seen here about six months ago, and he is said to have spent a year in France with the A. E. F. The three men when arrested, attempted to bribe the police inspectors to win their release when they were cornered in a house at 33 1-2 Nineteenth street, according to word received here.
