LEAGUE GAMES ARE RAPID-FIRE
Anderson-Browns and Capital Nationals Winners in Last Night's Fray

The Anderson-Brown basketball team defeated the United States National bank team by a score of 17 to 7 and the Capital National bank team won from the team of Hauser Brothers with a tally of 13 to 11, last night in the Commercial league games at the Y. M. C. A. The four teams of the league are noticeably improved since the first were played.

The first game of the evening was contested by the Capital National and Hauser Brothers teams. The teams were well matched and the score was kept low. Both teams scored more in the first half than in the last half. Rheinhardt, Hulse and Hart made the first half what it was by their aggressive playing. The score was 9 to 6 in favor of Hauser Brothers as the first 20 minutes were played out. The last half all the players were warmed to the game and a hard and well general battle was the order. The Capital National team came to the front along the middle of the last half and the final score was 11 to 13 in its favor.

The players of the Capital National Bank team were Hulse and Socolofsky, forwards; Hart, center; Claus and Hull, guards.

The Hauser Brothers line-up was Orcutt and Rheinhardt, forwards; Springer, center; Socolofsky and Bayne, guards.

The best game of the evening was between the teams of Anderson-Brown and the United States National bank, both of which had good players and it was believed by some observers that if the United States National players were more proficient in basketballing the score probably would have favored them.

The first period of the game went a little slow. The Anderson-Brown team showed the most fight and as a result the first half ended in its favor 9 to 2. Dr. Utter and Harrel did good work for the United States National team. Utter made a few remarkable baskets. Harra, Brown and Gosser, playing forwards and center on the Anderson-Brown team were in the game every minute of play and later they worked up some passing that would do credit to a college team. Clark and Patterson who were guards for the team are not to be forgotten, as their work was commented on by those in attendance. During the last few minutes of play the two teams showed about the best playing the league has had for this year. The final tally was 17 to 7 in favor of Anderson-Brown.

Mrs. Cheffings Asks for Damages From Railroad
An amended complaint was filed in the circuit court yesterday by Estella Cheffings, administratrix of the estate of the late Charles Cheffings.

in her suit against the United States railroad administration for damages of \$20,000 alleging the death of her husband was caused by injuries incurred while in the government employ near Aumsville.

Mrs. Cheffings in her complaint claims that her husband was working on a department of the railroad called the "extra gang," and while en route to work, after he had reported for duty at Aumsville, he sustained injuries that resulted in his death. The government uses small motor cars as a means of conveyance of the members of the extra gang to the different locations along the railroad track where the repair work is needed. The plaintiff claims that the morning Mr. Cheffings was injured a motor car had left a few minutes previous to the one he left Aumsville on and further claims that the first motor stopped and the crew left it standing on the rails and as a consequence the following car collided with the one standing on the tracks. Her husband was injured to such an extent that he died later, she claims. In her complaint she alleged that the motor cars were in poor repair and the one car that collided had no brakes, which she says caused the accident.

Mrs. Cheffings asks the court to award her \$20,000 damages and the costs and disbursements of the suit. Of this amount she asks \$10,000 for the care and support of herself and two minor children, whom she claims, would have been taken care of had not the accident occurred, and \$10,000 for the pain and suffering that her husband was subject to before his death.
