CHINESE SAID TO BE CHOICE

Labor Commissioner Gram Wants Hines to Bring Threlkeld to Time

M. C. Threlkeld of San Francisco, who is said to have a contract with the federal railroad administration to provide sustenance to construction and maintenance-of-way crews

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of the Southern Pacific company in California and Oregon, is discriminating against white labor and in favor of Orientals in hiring cooks, if representations are correct in a letter sent by C. H. Gram, state labor commissioner, to Walker D. Hines, railroad administrator. It appears that Threlkeld is supported in this policy by E. M. Anderson, with offices in the Panama building, Portland, who has charge of the San Francisco man's interests in Oregon. The apparent policy of Threlkeld was brought to the attention of the labor department through an incident on the Southern Pacific line between Eugene and Marshfield where a foreman, newly placed in charge of a bridge gang, discharged a Chinese cook and replaced him with a white man, only to receive orders a few days later to discharge the white man and make way for another Chinese.

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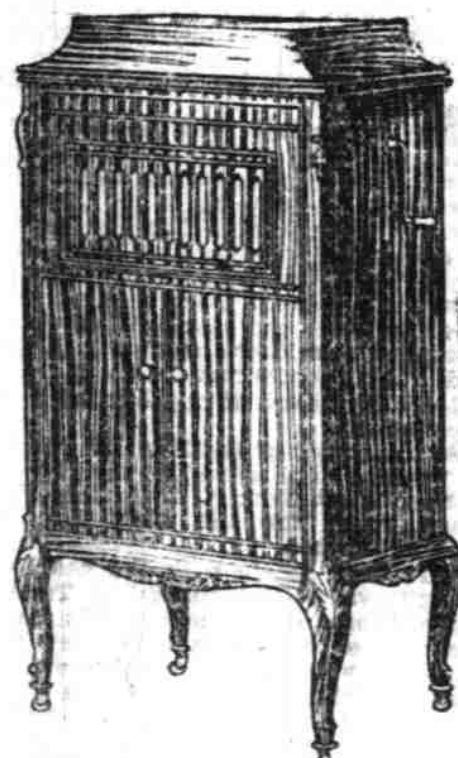
