The club is organized on an independent basis and will begin the season's games about April 1. Judging by the present players on Manager Bishop's list there is positive proof that this year's ball club will surpass any teams of former seasons.

The club will be conducted as an independent club and will play the season's games with the foremost clubs of Oregon and Washington. It was suggested that a baseball league be formed by the local towns of Oregon. This was given up because it was believed that this would not give the Salem club enough scope. The games will be played on Saturday af-
