PROGRAM WILL BE GIVEN FOR BUREAU WORK

Children's Clinic to be Forwarded by Co-operation of Club Leaders

FEBRUARY TEST DATED

Musicians and Readers Are Enlisted in Cause of Better Babies

Tentative plans for an entertainment to be given for the benefit of the Marion County Children's bureau, were made at the regular monthly meeting of the organization, in the Commercial club, Thursday afternoon. It is probable that the date will be Friday evening, February 20. A committee composed of Mrs. John A. Carson and Mrs. E. J. Swafford was named to secure a place for the affair, the Grand Opera house being suggested.

Professor Arthur Von Jessen, for several years head of Willamette university has been secured for the principal numbers on the program, and has arranged several numbers of great charm. His appearance here will be one of a trio of concerts, the two others to be given at the University of Oregon and Oregon Agricultural college. His position in the western musical world is firmly established, his artistry as a pianist being generally recognized. For a number of years he has had a studio in Portland. Local musicians and readers will assist on the program.

A program committee composed of Mrs. E. C. Patton chairman, Mrs. W. Connel Dyer, Mrs. A. E. Hucklestein, Jr., and Mrs. R. M. Hofer, was chosen. Mrs. Edwin F. Carlton was asked to name her own committee to be in charge of printing, sale of tickets, and various incidental details.

An admission fee of 50 cents for adults and 25 cents for students and children will be charged. The sale of tickets will begin shortly, and will be under the auspices of a group of women, to be named later. The money raised through the concert will be used to further child welfare in Marion county, already so successfully begun by the Marion County Children's bureau. A thorough publicity program will be carried out throughout the country, persons affiliated with the bureau in valley towns to be asked to assist in the sale of tickets and in advertising both the concert and the work of the bureau.

At the meeting yesterday Mrs. H. A. Smart was appointed chairman of the committee to arrange for monthly lectures for mothers at the Commercial club. Serving on this committee with her will be Mrs. Gail Church and Mrs. A. A. Mickel. A local doctor will be asked to discuss some subject of vital importance to mothers who have children of clinic age, from six months to six years and over. The first lecture will be given the first week in February, the exact date of which will be announced later.

It was proposed to make the March clinic a special one for children who are proving a problem to parents because of under-development, malnutrition or kindred causes. The February clinic will be held on February 19, a large number of children

already being registered for it. Hereafter children past clinic age will be accepted for examination on clinic dates. Careful attention will be given to them, the same as to others, but no official score cards will be issued.

A follow-up committee composed of Mrs. David Eyre and Mrs. W. Connel Dyer will look after the cases listed each month that require special attention. An effort will be made to have children looked after immediately.

A motion was also made to extend official thanks to Salem stores for the loan of a layette and sanitary bed exhibited at the last clinic.
