

LEAGUE STORE TO COME HERE

Co-operative Mercantile Organizer Is Planning to Reach Salem Soon

The Pacific Co-operative league is establishing a chain of retail stores in Oregon and Salem is one of the cities where an attempt will be made to locate one of these stores.

This is the positive statement made yesterday by C. E. Stead who says that he is state representative of this mercantile venture and that an attempt will be made within the next

three months to open one of the co-operative business houses here.

"We are not a new concern," said Mr. Stead. "We are operating along old and well-tried lines. We have adopted the Rochdale system in conducting our business. The Rochdale system of cooperation, as you know, was started by laboring men in England over 80 years ago. It has proven so successful there that now it has become one of the largest business enterprises in Great Britain."

Mr. Stead made it clear that no attempt would be made to cut prices. He said food products, clothing and all kinds of home and farm supplies would be sold for cash at prevailing retail prices, but that, at the end of each three months the purchaser would receive a rebate on the amount of his purchases. This, he said usually amounts to about 8 per cent for members and 4 per cent for non-members.

"We have stores in Seattle, also one at St. Helena. We are now in Astoria and Portland where we will be ready for business soon," continued Mr. Stead. "We also have men at work in California. We are backed up by the State Federation of Labor-railroad brotherhoods and labor councils. Our one and only aim is to reduce the cost of living by reducing the expense of distribution to the lowest possible figure."

"We are now interested in the retail trade only, but as the business expands and the volume increases we expect to open a chain of whole sale houses through which we will be able to reduce still further our current expenses. Such savings, will, of course, result in benefitting the patrons of our stores."

about the store in contemplation for Salem, Mr. Stead said the nature of the store would be largely governed by the number of residents and the membership that can be secured. He stated for a city of 10,000 people, a minimum of 200 families would be enough to start a good grocery and general provision store and that to establish a store carrying general merchandise, a membership of about 400 families is necessary.

\$2400 to pay an indebtedness, \$1800 for improvements to property and \$12,500 for current expenses. The church is practically out of debt.

BAPTIST PASTOR LEAVES TUESDAY

Dr. G. F. Holt to Close Service in Salem With Sunday's Meetings

Dr. G. F. Holt closes his pastorate with the First Baptist church of this city with the services of Sunday.

Tuesday with his family he leaves for Seattle which will be their future home. Dr. Holt having accepted the position of director of promotion for the West Washington Baptist convention.

Dr. Holt has been pastor here since March 1, 1916, coming here from Riverside, Cal., where he had a successful pastorate of over eight years. The church has had a gratifying growth under Dr. Holt's ministry. 327 members having been received during the four years. The present membership is 717.

From March 31, 1916 to March 31, 1920, approximately \$25,000 will have been raised and expended: \$8300 for missions and benevolences.
