Howard, against the Hotel Marion company and Walker D. Hines, director of the railroad, asking for damages of \$7500. Mr. Howard in the complaint filed yesterday claimed that Theodore Howard was killed in an accident which occurred in 1919, on State street when a motorcycle he was riding was struck by a bus of the Marion Hotel and the boy was thrown under an approaching street-car and died soon after the accident. Mr. Howard claimed that the boy had the right-of-way over the auto bus and that the auto was driven by an inexperienced driver who was running the machine at a rate of 30 miles an hour. The plaintiff alleged that the street car was not equipped with air brakes which are prescribed by law and as a result the boy was killed by the negligence of the two companies and asks the court to award him judgment of \$7500, which is the limit allowed by law for injuries which result in death.
