American Legioners at Dallas Again Victorious

DALLAS, Or., Jan. 31.—(Special to The Statesman)—The Company K basketball team of Independence went down to defeat at the hands of the Dallas American Legion team on the armory floor last night by a score of 46 to 11.

The game was fast from start to finish but the superior team work of the legion players had a telling effect on the militiamen who were unable to keep the ball near their own goal. At the end of the first half the score stood 21 to 4. Dallas defeated Independence several weeks ago by about two points and expected a stiffer resistance in the game last night.

Prior to the Dallas-Independence game a contest was staged between the Woodburn high school team and the Dallas high school team. The result ended with a 14 to 9 score in favor of the local players. These teams were evenly matched and it was a toss up until the latter part of the game just who would come out winner. At the close of the game a light lunch was served by the members of the Company K, auxiliary and a social dance indulged in.

EXECUTION FOR RADICALS URGED

Judge Landis Suggests Drastic Measures for Handling Undesirable Reds

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Jan. 31.—Execution rather than deportation of "treason agitators" was advocated by Judge K. M. Landis of Chicago, who branded the socialist, I.W.W. and kindred organizations as "traitors to the country" in an address before the American Protective league here tonight.

Judge Landis reviewed the platforms and activities of "red" organizations and urged "war to clean up the whole bunch of them."

"What we need is a new definition of treason," Judge Landis said. "then we can use the side of a barn for those who would destroy our government. We must destroy the would-be destroyers."

Judge Landis vigorously denounced profiteers and socialists and the latter's war program.

"The socialist party is guilty of the crime of treason," he said. "I condemn them as heartily as I can. They can't have immunity where I happen to be."

Regarding the profiteer, he said: "The English language is bankrupt for me to express my contempt of profiteers. When the political organization that I used to train with gets into power next fall I'll point out a few of these gentlemen."

The non-partisan league also was attacked.

"I understand some candidates are flirting with votes of the non-partisan league," he declared. "They hope to get some Republican or Democratic votes and then the non-partisan vote. Let those fellows content themselves with those kind of votes. They hope to get in power by a split vote of good citizens. Forget the Republican and Democratic parties. Get together and beat them. The socialists, the I.W.W. and the non-partisan league are all the same—their fundamentals are the same."

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 31.—Protest against the action of a Milwaukee post of the American legion in admitting Jack Dempsey to honorary membership and recommendation that the Milwaukee post's charter be revoked was sent to national headquarters of the organization at Indianapolis today by Walter K. Tuller, chairman of the inter-post council of the legion in Los Angeles.

LABOR IS URGED TO JOIN FORCES

Samuel Gompers Would Organize All Republics Into One Great Association

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—Workers in Latin-American republics are urged in a manifesto issued today by Samuel Gompers, chairman, and other officials of the Pan-American Federation of Labor, to organize national labor associations for affiliation with the Pan-American organization. This action is urged "to the end that the workers of all the American countries may be better prepared to act concertedly for their mutual protection and advancement and to impose a check upon those forces who would subordinate them to their own material aggrandizement."

Calling attention to the third pan-American labor congress to be held in Mexico City, July 12, the manifesto says the workers in America should begin now to make preparations for sending their representatives.

LABOR DEMANDS A 'SQUARE DEAL'

Suspension of Socialists Spurs Conference To Urge Seating of Assemblymen

ALBANY, N. Y., Jan. 31.—The demand that the five socialist assemblymen suspended during an investigation of their eligibility to service be immediately seated and calling upon all delegates and their constituencies to pledge the defeat of every member of the assembly in any responsible for the "un-American, unconstitutional and indefensible ousting of these duly elected representatives, was adopted unanimously at a conference of labor, civic and social organizations here today.

Louis Waldman, the only socialist assemblyman to speak was loudly cheered when he declared that politicians were not afraid of resolutions but of action by the people. He urged all tonight to fight "the crew that is attempting to destroy the rights of American citizens."

Kreanon Named Commander of New Guard Company

DALLAS, Or., Jan. 31.—(Special to The Statesman)—Thirty-four members of Company L, the new militia company, were sworn in at the armory last night, thus reviving old Company L which took part in both the Mexican border trouble and the war with Germany.

Robert S. Kreanon, a captain during the late war, has been appointed by Adjutant General Staffin as captain of the new company. About 25 members who had signed up to join the company were detained for various reasons and were unable to be sworn in last night. These, however, will be taken care of at a future date.

After the company had been sworn in a banquet was tendered them by the women of the Company L auxiliary.

DEVIL IS FEARED BY OIL MAGNATE

Rockefeller Sounds Warning To Delegates Attending Laymen's Convention

PITTSBURGH, Jan. 31.—John D. Rockefeller, Jr., addressing the delegates of the National Laymen's conference and their hosts, 100 prominent Pittsburgh citizens, at a banquet here tonight, sounded a solemn note of warning concerning the future of the movement.

"If jealousy, suspicion, pettiness and misunderstanding are allowed to crop in there is a possibility this movement will be disrupted and brought to an end," said Mr. Rockefeller.

"I fancy we can count on the fact that the devil will use all the ingenuity of which he is capable to attack this great movement, in just that way—from within—for he will know that in no other possible way can he offset or withstand the great power and force of which it is capable."

Officers Spy on Man; Catch Him Selling Booze

DALLAS, Or., Jan. 31.—(Special to The Statesman)—Peter (Wildgoose) Reddekopp, a Dallas citizen, was arrested by Sheriff Orr and City Marshal Chase at his home in the south part of town on a charge of selling intoxicating liquor.

Reddekopp has been under suspicion for some time but it was not until Sunday, when the authorities made a local arrest that the evidence pointed to the arrested man's door. The sheriff and marshal concealed themselves near his home that evening and caught him in the act of selling a bottle and immediately placed him under arrest. Reddekopp tried to convince the officers that his wife was the one who made the booze but was unsuccessful.

At a hearing before Justice Sibley Monday morning he pleaded guilty and was fined \$50.

Garment Workers Are Granted Wage Advance

CINCINNATI, O., Jan. 31.—Approximately 100,000 garment workers in the United States and Canada have been granted increased wages. It was announced tonight as a result of a conference between representatives of the United Garment Workers of America and the United Garment Manufacturers' association of America here. Piece workers are to receive a 20 per cent increase and cutters an advance of six dollars per week effective February 15.

WESTERN TRAIL BLAZER IS DEAD

William C. A. Smoot, Father of Eighteen Children, Pioneer of West

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Jan. 31.—William C. A. Smoot, last survivor of the original band of pioneers which reached the valley of Salt Lake July 4, 1847, with Brigham Young, died here tonight. Many of his relatives and friends were with him last Friday to celebrate his ninety-second birthday.

Mr. Smoot was one of the first company of men to break the trail between Salt Lake and Los Angeles, Cal. He was one of 30 young men called by Brigham Young to go to Las Vegas to build a fort there to protect immigrants and the United States mail from Indians, and to teach the latter how to raise wheat, corn, potatoes, squash and melons.

Mr. Smoot was the father of eighteen children.

FLU DEATH TOLL IS ON INCREASE

Victims of Disease in Chicago Since January 15 Total More Than 1500

CHICAGO, Jan. 31.—Deaths from influenza and pneumonia since January 15 totaled 1668, it was reported tonight by the health department. During the same period last year 26,888 cases were reported.

Although there was a sharp decline in the number of new cases today the death toll was the heaviest since the contagion appeared. Influenza causes 122 deaths and pneumonia 85, while new cases of the former numbered 860 and of the latter 352.

PORTLAND, Jan. 31.—Presiding Judge John McCourt in the circuit court today took under advisement the petition of George Greenfield, who is seeking to have the Central Labor council and the local clerks' union enjoined from picketing two stores which he operates here, and against which strikes of clerks were recently called.
