GUARD SCRUTINY IS THIS MONTH

**Colonel Koester of Vancouver
to Inspect Oregon Na-
tional Guard**

Conrad Stafrin, adjutant general for
Oregon announced Saturday that fed-

eral inspection of the National guard of Oregon will begin February 15 and continue to March 20. Colonel Koester, in command at Vancouver barracks, has been assigned by the militia bureau of the war department to conduct the inspection. Colonel Koester will personally visit and inspect every company of the national guard in the state. Ordinarily federal inspection is made once each year, but the inspection of this year will be the first since before the war.

INSURANCE OF SERVICE MEN MORE LIBERAL

**Policies May Be Re-Instated
any Time Before July 1
Is Ruling**

BENEFITS ARE INCREASED

**List of Beneficiaries is Ex-
tended Payment in Lump
Sum Optional**

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—Former service men may reinstate their war risk term insurance at any time before July 1, 1920, under a new ruling of the bureau of war risk insurance, announced today by Director Cholmeley-Jones.

Applicants will be re-instate regardless of how long their policies have lapsed, or how long the former service men have been discharged provided two monthly premiums accompany the application and the applicant is in as good health as when his policy was issued.

The bureau issued the following statement: "The new ruling is the most insistent bill and is designed for the prompt liberalization of war risk insurance since the passage of the failed to reinstate their insurance special benefit of service men who prior to the new law and who have been discharged more than 18 months. Men who have been discharged less than 18 months may still reinstate their lapsed term insurance at any time within 18 months following the month of discharge by complying with the same conditions.

Changes More Liberal.
"In announcing the new ruling, Director Cholmeley-Jones desires to emphasize the fact that war risk term insurance may now be made payable to any of the following new and enlarged group of beneficiaries: "Parent, grandparent, step-parent, wife (or husband), step-child, adopted child, grandchild, brother, sister, half-brother, half-sister, a brother through adoption, a sister through adoption, step-brother, step-sister, parent through adoption, uncle, aunt, nephew, niece, brother-in-law, sister-in-law, persons who have stood in the relation of a parent to the insured for a period of one year or more prior to his enlistment or induction, or the child or children of

such persons, parent, grandparent, step-parent or parent through adoption of the insured's wife or husband. "War risk term insurance may be converted into United States government insurance now or at any time within five years after the end of the war.

"Converted insurance may now be paid in a lump sum at death, if such method of payment is designated by the insured."

W. in the court room of Judge Ben Sheeks, across the hall from that in which the murder trial is being held. The 13 men were to go to trial Monday on charges of criminal syndicalism. Judge Sheeks today overruled a demurrer to the informations and set the trial for Monday. It was to have begun today, but was postponed on account of the illness of J. E. Stewart, county prosecutor of Grays Harbor county.

TESTING OF SYSTEM URGED

**Federal Farm Loan Associa-
tion Doubts Validity of Tor-
rens Method**

Among resolutions adopted at the recent convention of the State Farm Loan association in Salem was that recommended by the board of directors to the effect that action be brought to test the validity of the present Torrens system of land titles in Oregon. The full set of resolutions, signed by the committee on resolutions, composed of E. H. Hard, D. N. Mackay, J. O. Stemmler, E. B. Hull, Jr., and W. S. Roberts, follows:

"That all associations, their officers and members, join in a vigorous campaign to test the farm loan bonds of this district.

"We favor a hearty cooperation between the farm loan associations, appraisers, and the Federal Land bank of this district that credit may be given to all worthy farmers and all soldiers and sailors desiring to take up agricultural, horticultural and stock raising as far as possible consistent with safety to the associations and land bank.

"We appreciate the untiring efforts and success of the officers and directors of the land bank of this district and pledge them our hearty cooperation.

"We appreciate the kind courtesy of the members of the Salem Commercial club in extending to our associations the use of their rooms and their hearty cooperation as well as to the Rotary club of Salem in their courtesies shown this organization during our session and hereby extend to them an early vote of thanks. Also the press.

"Whereas, the farm mortgage bankers and others similarly situated and interested are now engaged in legal contest in the courts to have the federal farm loan act declared unconstitutional, and failing there, are making an aggressive fight in congress to have said act either repealed or so amended as to nullify the benefits accruing to the farmers under this act, and

"Whereas, we believe that the provisions of this act, relating to the federal land banks, should be permitted to stand as originally enacted, and

"Whereas, we believe that this law is one of the most constructive pieces of legislation ever enacted by the American congress,

"Now, therefore, be it resolved, that we call upon our senators and congressmen to resist any and all efforts to either amend or repeal the Federal Farm Loan act.
