Professor Who Says His Rocket Can Hit the Moon After Four Days Flight



The moon is only four days away. That is the claim of Professor Robert H. Goddard of Clark University, Worcester, Mass., who says he has invented a multiple high charge efficiency rocket. If his theory is carried to its extreme the rocket would be capable of covering the 230,000 miles between the earth and the moon in a little more than ninety-six hours. He has also figured out just how observers will be able to determine whether a bull's-eye has been scored or the rocket misses the moon.
