

## AUDIENCE IS CHARMED BY DANCES OF MISS ST. DENIS AND TROUPE

Almost ethereal in personal grace and charm were Ruth St. Denis and her chorus of concert dancers who appeared at the Grand theatre last night.

Miss St. Denis explained briefly the difference between the dances of early popularity and those now gaining favor. She said that, since the close of the war, the world has shown an unusual interest in things spiritual, that at no previous time has human kind tried more persistently to give expression to emotional impulses than is being attempted at this time.

"The revival of the so-called classical dances," said Miss St. Denis, "is in response to a desire to express our emotional selves through harmonious physical action."

She preferred to use the words lyric dances, instead of classical dances. Dancing in the future she believed, would tend toward musical visualization.

The rear of the stage was curtained in light green through which a pale sheen of the moon cast a mellow light.

The bevy of dancers moved about in harmony with the notes of a master musical composition rendered on the piano. Now their emotions of gladness found expression in graceful, fairy-like vaulting movements, and again their rhythmic selves would give animated expression of tragic impulses, of shrinking fear or of deepest sorrow.

Ruth St. Denis has clearly gained complete mastery of the science and art of dancing. To her it is a means of expressing what is really beautiful, true and noble in life.

The concluding number last night typified the approach of spring. So artistic, so graceful, so expressive was its rendition by Miss St. Denis and her seven assistants that it was a fitting climax to the series of charming numbers that comprised the program of the evening.

In response to a final encore Miss St. Denis gracefully thanked her audience for the enthusiastic reception she and her assistants had received in Salem.

## SCOUTS AFTER \$5000 BUDGET FOR THIS YEAR

If Amount is Raised None Will Be Asked Next Year, Leader Says

### ACTIVITIES REVIEWED

Annual Meeting Is Held About Banquet Board at Y. M. C. A. Hall

A budget of \$5000 was asked for the coming year and new officers were elected at the second annual meeting of the Salem council of the Boy Scouts of America, at the Y. M. C. A. last night. The business meeting was conducted during an enjoyable dinner.

A financial report for the year was given. Harold Cook, scout executive of the Salem post, in his annual report asked for this year's budget, \$5000. He said that if this amount is subscribed for this year no budget will be asked for next year. The plans he has for meeting the next year's expenses was secluded in a secret all his own, that he said he would divulge at the next annual meeting if the amount is subscribed. By the present number of the men composing the Salem council it was shown that it would be difficult to raise this amount but as an alternative one of the council suggested that all present subscribe to their limit and then take a few of the subscription cards and get the rest of the money by adding more interested men to the council.

Support Is Economy

Speaking of the \$5000 budget, one of the council said: "We spend a goodly portion of this amount in paying the increased costs of the state training school, and extra policing of the city. The budget should be raised from an economic point of view, as the Boy Scout movement is recognized as a reaching to the coming voters and lawmakers all that is good and clean, and this is a big movement to offset the undesired impression that our young men may receive."

The new officers for this year that were elected at the meeting last night were: Scout commissioner of the Salem council, Walter Denton; president of the Salem council, E. A. Kurtz; first vice president, Theodore Roth; second vice president, F. K. Lovell; third vice president, D. K. Socolovsky; treasurer, D. W. Eyre; director of sea scouting, P. M. Gregory; director of camping, Jack Walker; director of finance, F. G. Deckbach; director of civic affairs, C. S. Hamilton.

An effort is being made to get live men in office who have not been on the Salem council before, thereby increasing the scope of the movement in Salem.

ceived a copy of the financial report for the Salem post for last year. The report shows that during 1919 the post received through subscription about \$1000 and a per capita assessment on the members to make a total of \$1182.20. Of this amount about \$500 was spent on supplies for the annual outing of the Scouts held last year at Salt creek. The running expenses of the post used enough of the money on hand to leave a balance of \$682.20 which includes a number of unpaid subscriptions.

Harold Cook in the annual report brought to view a few of the noticeable good turns the Scouts did during the past year. They cleaned all the weeds from the graves of Civil war veterans at the cemetery and put the soil in a condition so grass can be planted. They took all of the worn out United States flags in this vicinity and have them in storage. These will be burned as this is the proper method of disposing of them when the proper time comes. The Scouts gathered from the houses of Salem a large amount of waste paper which was sold to junk dealers.

During the last year the Salem post has increased 100 per cent and now there are about 300 boys enlisted as members. Four new scoutmasters and three assistant scoutmasters have been added.

## RAILROAD TIED UP BY WALKOUT

Electricians on Main Line of Milwaukee Road Strike For Higher Wages

MISSOULA, Mont., Feb. 4.—Freight traffic over the electrified section of the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul railroad from Harlowton, Mont., to Avery, Idaho, 440 miles, tonight was paralyzed and passenger trains of the system were being sent over the Northern Pacific tracks between Henderson, Mont., as a result of a strike of approximately 100 electricians and electrical maintenance men which occurred today.

The men left their jobs according to information available, as a protest against non-receipt of back pay they claim because of the discontinuance last November of a bonus of nine hours pay for eight hours work. It was reported at Bozeman tonight that Director General Hines had telegraphed the electricians that the strike was in violation of their contract and ordered them to return to work.

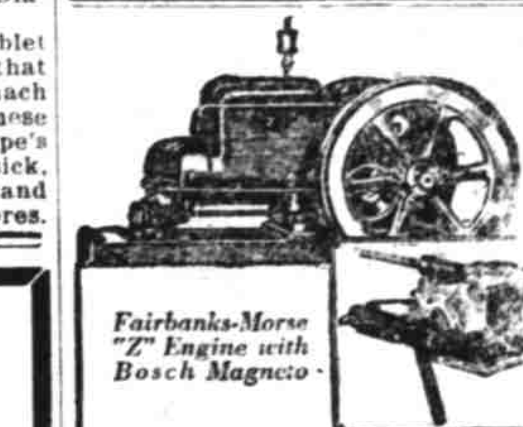

## BROKER ROBBED BY IMPOSTERS; STORY IS TOLD

Vienna Police Hold Swindlers on Charges of Obtaining Money Unlawfully

### OLD GAME IS REVIVED

Men Claiming to be Representatives of Government Profited by Transaction

VIENNA, Jan. 15.—A Vienna money broker was robbed of 2,000,000 rubles the other day in a political plot to obtain control of the Ukrainian legation here. The story as worked out by the police is as good as a play.

The scheme was the familiar confidence game of inducing the broker to violate the law and of seizure of the money by criminals disguised as gendarmes.

A supposed Ukrainian recently arrived in Vienna and engaged with a money broker to buy up to 2,000,000 rubles. It is illegal in Austria to deal in foreign money or to have it in private possession, and all foreign exchange is done through authorized banks. The broker agreed to have the amount in hand on a certain day. He lived and conducted his business in a hotel.

On the appointed afternoon, but a little ahead of time, a man in the uniform of a Ukrainian colonel called on the broker and saluting said he came for General X's money. They sat down to a table to check the money, when the door was opened and two gendarmes walked in and placed both under arrest on the charge of possessing and dealing in foreign money.

The broker begged and protested and finally was told to appear in court on the following day, his record being taken with the greatest care and particularity. But the colonel's protests were unavailing. He stormed and invoked his nationality in vain. The policemen gathered up the money, counted it and, giving a receipt, told the broker to appear promptly before the authorities.

Then, taking the colonel, they left. An hour later the colonel woke up to the fact that the colonel and the two gendarmes were fakers and he had been robbed of some 2,000,000 rubles.

The Vienna police is efficient in this kind of thing and in a day or two had gathered in two of the swindlers, but not the one with the money. Working on the case they finally ascertained that the money was being used for political ends. The plan, according to the police reports, was a plot to seize the Ukrainian legation here by an opposing political faction, get possession of the records and seals and defy the existing government, a plot characteristic of the present unsettled state of affairs in eastern Europe. The legation, however, had wind of it and was prepared for whatever might happen. The police say this is the second plot to the same end frustrated.

## CONFERENCE OF FINANCE HEADS GAINS IN FAVOR

Secretary Glass May Appoint Representatives to Attend Gathering

### CONDITIONS SET FORTH

American Delegates, if Elected Will Act in Strictly Informal Capacity

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.—While acknowledging its acceptance of the limitations suggested recently by Secretary Glass on the proposed international financial conference, the chamber of commerce of the United States announced tonight it was prepared under certain conditions to designate representatives to attend such a gathering.

These conditions, as set forth by a special committee of the chamber to which the question of the conference was referred, were announced tonight as follows: "That there be brought to the notice of the European governments, and of the signatories of the European memorial the letter of the secretary of the treasury delivered January 28, 1920.

"That if the European governments should still decide to hold a conference of the kind which the chamber of commerce has held, the activities and discussions at such a conference be kept within the limitations mentioned in the letter of the secretary of the treasury.

"That the American representatives be informed that they are to act in an entirely informal capacity and that their continued presence at the proposed conference is to depend upon such activities, and discussions being kept within the limitations heretofore mentioned."

### Profiteering Hard Hit By Courts at Vienna

VIENNA, Feb. 4.—Mobile courts have been established here to expedite trial of persons charged with illegal pricing of fixed priced articles. They consist of three members, one a merchant or business expert, and if the verdict is unanimous there is no appeal. The regular courts are so congested with cases of this char-

acter that the calendar never could be cleared.

A curious result of this delay was shown in a case tried the other day. The merchant was charged with overpricing last June. In the trial his counsel showed that the article in question now sells for five times more than the price he then asked.

### Discovery of America Told in Ancient Paper

BERLIN, Feb. 4.—A letter written by Columbus regarding the discovery of America, a newspaper dated 1508 which records the discovery of Brazil, and many other century old exhibits are to be features of an exhibition being organized by the German Museum of Books and Manuscripts in Leipzig relating to historical development of the newspaper. The exhibits will indicate the growth of newspaper making from its 16th century beginning down to the appearance of the weekly newspapers and to the achievements of 18th and 19th centuries.

## HUNS EXPECTED TO SHOW FIGHT

Surrender of Men Wanted in Connection With War Not Possible

LONDON, Thursday, Feb. 5.—"The surrender of these men is very impossible, turn it how you will," said Minister of Defense Noske in an interview with the Daily Mail's Berlin correspondent in discussing the demands for the extradition by the allies of Germans charged with war crimes.

"This demand is an act of revenge worse than Shylock's," he continued.

"Suppose I succeeded in getting the men arrested. Do you think the train taking them to France would be allowed to cross the frontier? And if a crowd held up that train, do you imagine I could order Germans shot down so that other Germans could be handed over to the revenge of their enemies? The government might resign, but what party could take its place?"
