Miss Hughes spoke highly of the work done in Salem with the limited quarters and small budget and says she is sure the citizens will meet the demands of this organization in its work to help the women of the city. Miss Hughes spoke from a wide experience as she has been a local secretary in a large Ohio city, executive secretary of the Ohio and West Virginia field, and has participated in all large meetings of the association. Miss Hughes emphasized her belief, respect and love for girls as she has touched them in all parts of the country.

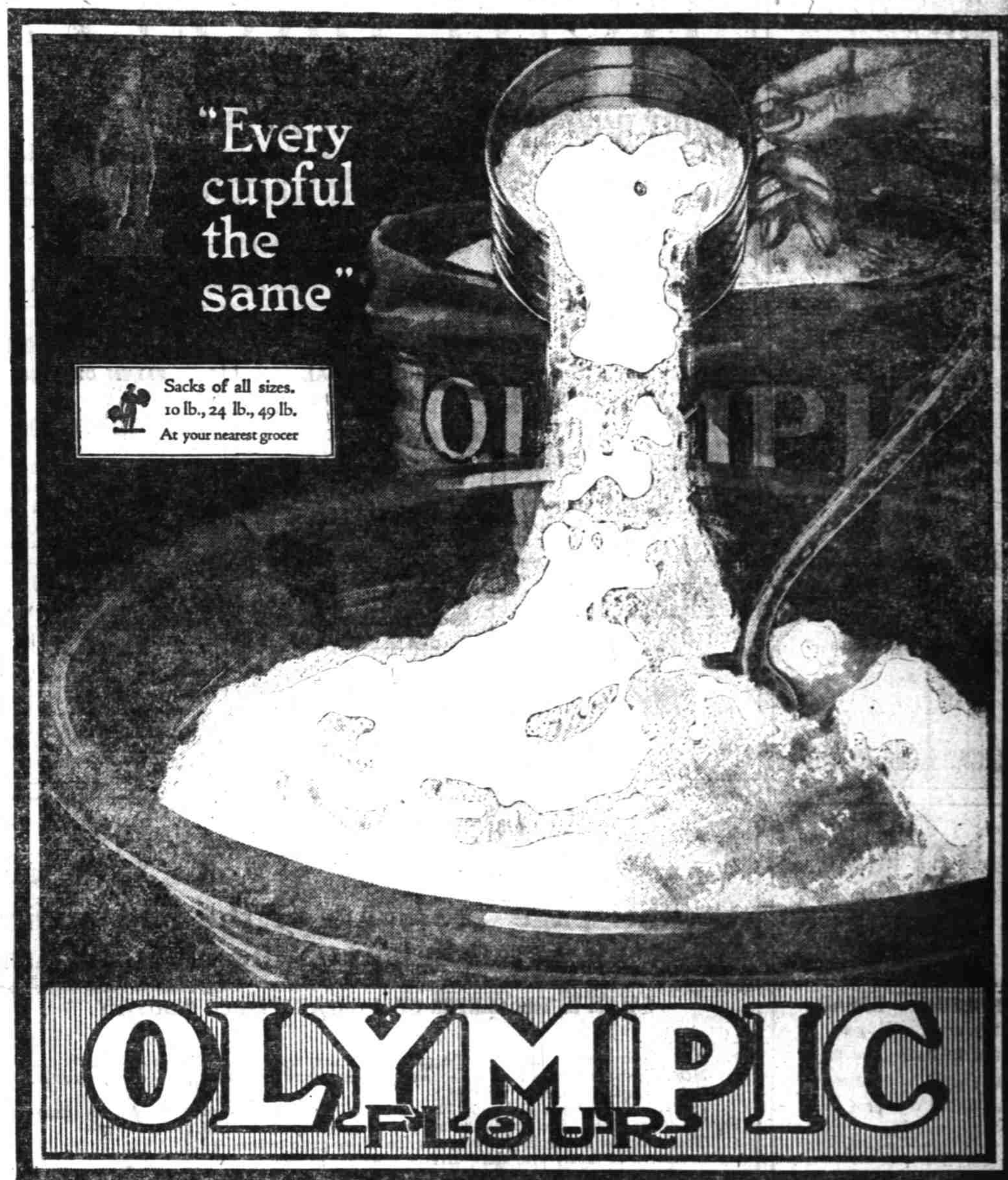

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MEDAL AWARD HELD UNJUST

Man in Navy Before War Was Declared Writes Letter of Protest

Some Oregon boys who were in the army or navy of the United States prior to the declaration of war with Germany have expressed disappointment at not being considered as entitled to medals for service against the enemy. Because of the terms of the legislative act appropriating money for the medals it does not extend to those men.

Frank W. Lott, printer first class on the U. S. S. New Mexico, now stationed at San Pedro, Calif., writes a letter of protest to The Statesman. Lott wrote the secretary of state relative to the medals. His letter was referred to the adjutant general who informed him that since his enlistment had been on March 12, 1916, one year prior to the war, he is not entitled to the state medal.

Mr. Lott writes as follows: "Sometime ago I noticed in the Popular Mechanics magazine that the state of Oregon was giving medals to all her citizens who served in the world war."

"On January 12 of this year, I

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wrote a letter to the secretary of state of Oregon, and requested one of the said medals. (The letter was referred to the adjutant general's office), as I am a citizen of the state and therefore feel that I am as much entitled to the honors as any one else, even though I enlisted one year prior to the war. I was on active service and stood watch and watch beside Oregon men who enlisted after war was declared, and we all ran the same dangers looking for the Hun submarines.

"I have been wondering what the men who were in the service at the beginning of the war, would have done if the U. S. A. had not already had an army and navy. 'I have also been wondering if the adjutant general, or whoever is responsible for the giving out of the state medals, thinks that the men who came in prior to the war, would have taken to the toll sticks if they had waited until war was actually declared. Although many is the time we have tried to get out of the service since the war, we were here before it started, were here all during said conflict, and what's more we are still here.

"It appears to me the refusal to grant state medals to the men who came in before the war, is a direct challenge to their patriotism and in another way it looks like the state of Oregon didn't or don't care to honor our service, as much as to war—we didn't care if they got killed, we knew their not."

Monmouth Water System Will Be Investigated

The state engineering department has received a request to examine the proposed water system of the city of Monmouth which proposes to take a municipal water supply from Teal creek. The storage of 200,000 gallons in a reservoir is proposed. The estimated cost will be \$50,000.

The following applications have been received by the department:

By C. Ray Beckley of Portland, covering the use of water from the John Day river for power development and irrigation purposes.

By H. A. Taihot and C. C. Whitmore of Klamath Falls, covering the appropriation of water from Klamath river for the irrigation of 125 acres near Klamath Falls.

By Robert L. Hart of Salem, covering the appropriation of water from unnamed springs for the irri-

gation of a small tract, and for the propagation of trout.

By C. W. Hall, Baker, covering the appropriation of the overflow from the municipal reservoir for the irrigation of a 65 acre tract.

By A. D. Reed of Grants Pass, covering the appropriation of water from Rogue river for the irrigation of a small tract near Grants Pass.

By Andrew Dahl, Baker, for the appropriation of water from unnamed streams for the irrigation of a small tract near Keating.

Murder of Celebrated Gunman Held Mystery

CHICAGO, Feb. 4.—The murder of Maurice "Boss" Enright, labor leader and the last of four notori-

ous Chicago gunmen, whose body was riddled with dum dum bullets from a sawed-off shotgun in front of his home last night, remained an unsolved mystery tonight.

More than 40 suspects were taken in a police roundup, but the majority were released.

Enright was the twenty-third labor leader to pay with his life for his share in labor wars in Chicago in the last ten years.
