FORMER HEAD OF STATE HELD FOR THEFT OF FUNDS

Horace Graham Faces Sen-
ten of Ten Years in Ver-
mont Penal Institution

CASE WILL BE APPEALED

Former Official Found Guilty
on 56 Counts—Attempt
to Explain Futile

MONTPELIER, Vermont, Feb. 5. Former Governor Horace F. Graham was found guilty by a jury today on 56 counts charging larceny of state funds while he was state auditor from 1913 to 1917 when he became governor.

Counsel for Graham announced that the case would be taken to the supreme court. The penalty for larceny may be ten years in prison or a fine of \$500 or both. Sentence will be imposed tomorrow.

Graham contended that the disparity in his accounts of nearly \$9,000 represented not shortages but a balance on outstanding orders and that in drawing to his personal account against the state he acted solely with the view of expediting business.

GREAT ACREAGE UNDER CONTROL

Growers' Co-operative Association Has Listed Hundreds of Farmers

The crops of over 19,000 acres of fruit and nut orchards in Oregon have been signed over to the Oregon Growers' Co-operative association by about 800 farmers who have promised to sell their products through the organization for a period of five years. The offices of the association have been changed to the fifth floor of the Masonic building, and as the season's crops are nearing harvest, the entire upper floor will be occupied by the growers' association.

According to the records of the association, the organization has the crops of between 19,000 and 20,000 acres of land in Oregon and Southern Washington under its control. The present acreage is the association's accomplishment to date and as the season progresses this amount will probably be doubled. At present C. I. Lewis and M. O. Evans are in the Rogue River district near Medford where they are soliciting acreage for the organization. The results of last week show that between 2500 and 3000 acres of apple and pear crops have been contracted by them.

If the acreage contracts for this week match up with last it is probable that the association will build a packing plant in that vicinity to accommodate the products. The association owns a plant at Roseburg and will buy or build additional packing plants in the various parts of the Willamette valley where they are needed. J. O. Holt of Eugene is in charge of this department.

R. C. Paulus is in charge of the selling and market end of the operation. He is in the east now making arrangements for the disposition of the association's crops when they are ready for the market.

Seymour Jones, who was speaker of the house at the last session of state legislature, is secretary and treasurer of the association, and is office manager of the home office here.

CHURCHES PLAN ORGANIC UNION

United Churches of Christ in
America Suggested Title
of Amalgamation

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 5.—A plan for organic union of protestant churches of America was adopted here today by delegates representing approximately 30 denominations at the three day discussion and the new movement will be under the guidance of the American Council on organic union of the churches of Christ, a name officially selected by the delegates. The plan was drawn by Henry W. Jessup, New York, representing the Presbyterian church in the United States. Dr. William Henry Roberts, stated clerk of the Presbyterian general assembly and chairman of the ad interim committee which considered the plan, was unanimously chosen president of the council.

The plan provides that Christian churches having the same faith in Christ shall agree to associate themselves in a body known as "the United Churches of Christ in America" for the furtherance of the redemptive work of Christ in the world. It holds for "autonomy in purely denominational affairs," with each church retaining its creedal statements, and its form of worship.

Mrs. Charles E. Low Dies After Illness of Few Days

Mrs. Reatha Hubbard Hughes Low wife of Charles E. Low, died at 1:30 o'clock Thursday morning at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Hughes, 1211 South Liberty street. She had been ill with Spanish influenza less than a week. Mrs. Low was a well known young woman and very popular socially.

Reatha Hughes was born at Bristol, Vermont, October 15, 1898, and came to Salem six years ago with her parents. She was married only last August to Charles Low, son of City Street Commissioner Walter Low and Mrs. Low and since that time has been living at Dundee. She is a graduate of Salem high school.

She is survived by her husband, her parents, and by two brothers, Harold of Portland and Merritt of San Francisco, both of whom have come to Salem.

The funeral services, conducted by Dr. R. N. Avison, will be held at the Rigdon chapel Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock. The body will be laid to rest in City View cemetery.

German County Surprised at Extradition Attempt

BERLIN, Feb. 5.—One of the most surprised men in Berlin was Count von Bernstorff, former ambassador to the United States who, it is said, is desired by the allies for his alleged connections with Bolo Pasha. The count, despite his surprise, seemed to be mildly amused. He declared that he was not afraid to face trial. He added that he was ready to go if desired and that he might even put the allies in a quandary if they attempted to prosecute him.

SEND BERGER TO PRISON PLEADS FEDERAL BRIEF

Convicted Socialist is Ac-
cused of Fraud in Con-
nection With Trial

JAIL SENTENCE STAYED

Radical Under Ruling of Jur-
ist Must Spend 20 Years
in Penitentiary

CHICAGO, Feb. 5.—In an answer filed today in the circuit court of appeals to a brief filed by attorney for Victor L. Berger, convicted socialist, District Attorney Charles F. Linde, declared that Berger tried to perpetrate a fraud on the court and that he should be sent immediately to Leavenworth penitentiary to serve out his 20 year sentence.

The fraud charged is based on evidence that while out on bail under promise to refrain from all such activity Berger took part in a campaign to induce socialists to oppose conscription and the war.

Berger's appeal from the sentence passed by Federal Judge Landis is now pending.

COOKS FAVORED BY DRY RULING

New Yorkers Advised Not to
Do Without Brandy in
Their Mince Pies

NEW YORK, Feb. 5.—Charles O'Connor, state federal prohibition agent, announced tonight that alcoholic liquors can be used for cooking purposes without violating the law. Mr. O'Connor said:

"New Yorkers will have no need to do without brandy in their mince pies, or wine sauce on their puddings, as permits will be issued to hotels and restaurants to keep a stock of brandy and wine or whiskey on hand for legitimate culinary purposes."

TRAINS RESUME ON MILWAUKEE

Steam Replaces Electric Pow-
er to Cope With Walkout
of Workers

BUTTE, Mont. Feb. 5.—Passenger trains on the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul railroad tonight were running on their own tracks, drawn by steam locomotives, along the electrified section of the road from Miles City, Mont., to Avery, Ida., the steam engines having replaced electric power made useless when electricians at sub-stations struck yesterday in sympathy with 250 shopmen at Deer Lodge, Mont.

The shopmen left their jobs because of discontinuance of a bonus of nine hours' pay for eight hours' work.

NATION'S HUB MOVING EAST

Census Count Shows Center of
Population Is Not Coming
West

WASHINGTON, Feb. 5.—The decennial census, now being taken, will reveal that the center of population of the United States has moved eastward and not toward the west or south as commonly predicted. J. A. Hill, statistician of the census bureau predicted tonight in an address at the National Press club.

The 1910 census showed the center of population to be in Bloomington, Indiana, and in 1900 the center was some 50 miles eastward, or near Columbus of the same state.

After-the-war movement to the eastern cities, together with the war time growth of the eastern industrial centers, the statistician said, have more than counteracted the normal westward movement of population.
