MARKET ROADS TO GET FUNDS

Nearly Million Dollars Is Available State Highway Figures Show

Approximately \$883,466.22 is available for distribution to the 38 counties of Oregon during 1920 out of the market road fund, says a statement issued yesterday from the offices of the state highway department. While a given sum is mentioned as available to the respective counties only such amount will actually be turned over to any county as the county will match equally from funds raised in accordance with the market road act.

The following tabulation shows not only the amount available for each county, but also the amount raised by the counties as far as they have been reported:

Inquiring at the station for the trunk they found that it had been removed and with it went the silk garments which Mrs. Patton valued at \$225.
