No Fatalities Reported— For the first time in many months no fatal accident was reported to the state industrial accident commission for the week ending February 5. A total of 293 non-fatal accidents were reported. Of this number 265 were subject to the provisions of the compensation act, 23 were from firms and corporations that have rejected the act and five were from public utility corporations that are not subject to the act.
