Three very small lads of Sellwood who were afflicted with the ever present desire of youth, ventured forth from their respective homes to journey towards Roseburg. They were apprehended here by Officer Moffitt Friday afternoon and were held in jail for investigation.

Friday afternoon the local police were advised of the boys' presence near Chemawa. Officer Moffitt was detailed to watch for them as they were coming towards Salem. He located them and after an effort, for they tried to keep away from the clutches of the law, he caught and brought them before Chief Welsh.

Upon questioning them the chief was told they were on their way to Yoncalla, near Roseburg, and that their homes were in Sellwood. They claimed they had about \$10 when they started out and expected to reach their destination in about a week, and upon arriving said they would stay there with a friend whose acquaintance was cultivated last summer.

After an investigation Chief Welsh learned that the boys' names were Paul Waldette, 12; Cecil Proctor, 12; and Frank Austin, 15. The parents of Cecil Proctor were located and they said they were alarmed about the child's absence and were about to notify the Portland police, but were relieved to hear the child was safe and would send money to bring him home.
