

# J. H. ALBERT GIVES GROUND TO SENATORS

Salem Banker Comes to Relief of Biddie Bishop and His Players

## IMPROVEMENTS PLANNED

Grandstand, Bleachers and Protected Parkings Included in Program

The ballpark situation of the Salem Senators that has looked so dark for the past two weeks was considerably brightened recently when J. H. Albert, president of the Capital National bank, came to the assistance of the ball players with the offer of an ideal ball park, located at Twelfth and Judson streets.

The new grounds are considered an exceptional location and Biddie Bishop, the hustling manager, announced that he will take immediate steps to equip the grounds with bleachers and conveniences that will make the new park one of the best in the state.

The new site is very close to the streetcar lines, and far enough away so as not to be a source of disturbance to churches, hospitals and other places.

Contracts for leveling and fencing the grounds will be let in the immediate future as the Salem Senators are anxious to get into training for the early games.

A large grandstand and bleachers will be erected on the new grounds in addition to this another feature that will add to the attractiveness of the grounds is that Manager Bishop intends to provide protected parkings. This arrangement will allow car owners and out of town fans to witness the games without leaving their machines.

The first games of the season are scheduled with the Moosejaw and Regina teams, both well known as fast Canadian clubs. From the character and personnel of the Salem Senators Biddie Bishop believes that the team will be able to compete successfully with any of the semi-pro clubs, and with the proper local interest there is no reason why the Salem Senators should not be among the leaders.

Kraeke, Craig "Lefty" Schroeder, Hayes, Garner, O'Malley, Knickerbocker, Bishop, Miller, Holmes and other good players are lined up for the best season Salem ever had.

The Salem club's games will be played twice weekly, on Saturday afternoons and Sunday afternoons. When the club is not using the grounds it is the plan of the manager to hold them open for the use of the high school and the university and to put the grounds in such a condition that they will attract all Salem events.

# ARGUMENTS TO COME IN SOON

Kozer Announces Names of Legislators to Prepare Matter on Bills

Sam A. Kozer, deputy secretary of state, yesterday sent out notices to members of committees appointed

by the speaker of the house and the president of the senate to prepare arguments to be included in the voter's pamphlet relative to the several proposed constitutional amendments and measures submitted to the people by the special legislature in January to be voted on at the special election May 21. The arguments must be filed with the secretary of state by March 1.

The members of the committees and the measures on which they will prepare arguments are:

Constitutional amendment extending eminent domain over roads and ways—(S. J. R. 17, thirtieth legis-

lative assembly, amending article 1, section 1.)—Committee, Senators Thomas B. Handley, Tillamook and Representative Louis E. Bean, Eugene and W. V. Fuller, Dallas.

Constitutional amendment limiting of 4 per cent state indebtedness for permanent roads H. J. R. 11, special session, 1920, amending section 7, article XI.—Committee, Senators B. L. Eddy, Roseburg and Louis Lachmund, Salem, and Representative W. H. Gore, Medford, Loyal M. Graham, Forest Grove, and James S. Stewart, Fossil.

Constitutional amendment restoring capital punishment—(S. J. R. 8, special session, 1920, repealing section 36, article 1, and adding sections 37 and 38 to article 1.)—Committee on affirmative argument, Senator B. L. Eddy, Roseburg, and Representative K. K. Kubli, Portland, and David E. Loigren, Portland; on negative argument, Senator W. H. Strayer, Baker, and Representatives Mrs. Alexander Thompson, Hood River, and Eugene E. Smith, Portland.

Crook and Curry county bonding amendment—(S. J. R. 7, special session, 1920, amending section 10, article XI.)—Committee, Senators George T. Baldwin, Klamath Falls, and Colon R. Eberhard, La Grande,

and Representatives Denton G. Burdick, Redmond, and T. J. Thrift, Coquille.

Constitutional amendment providing for successor to governor—(S. J. R. 10, special session, 1920, amending section 8, article V.)—Committee, Senators Gus C. Moser, Portland, and W. W. Banks, Portland, and Representatives John B. Coffey, Portland, D. C. Lewis, Portland, and C. E. Woodson, Heppner.

Higher educational tax act—(H. B. 86, special session, 1920.)—Committee, to prepare arguments none authorized.

Soldiers', sailors' and marines' educational aid act revenue bill—(S. B. 40, special session, 1920.)—Committee, Senators Walter M. Pierce, La Grande, and I. S. Smith, Marshfield, and Representatives David M. Graham, Eugene, Ivan G. Martin, Salem, and Cyril G. Brownell, Umatilla.

State elementary school fund tax—(House Bill 34, special session, 1920.)—No committees authorized.

Blind school tax measure (H. B. 77, special session, 1920.)—No committees authorized.
