AUTO SHOW TO DEALERS SAY

Applications From Two Counties Cause Portlanders to Be Barred

CLOSED CAR FEATURED

Arrangements for Entertainment Are Perfected by Committee Members

From present indications the second annual automobile and truck show, scheduled for Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of next week, at the Salem armory under the auspices of the Marion-Polk County Automobile Dealers association, will eciipse all previous local efforts in this direction. This is evidenced by the number of applications from dealers in the territory named, for space at the show, indicating that approximately 50 different models of pleasure cars and some 20 trucks will be exhibited.

Although the national guard building has a floor space in excess of 8000 square feet the management of the forthcoming show is manifesting uneasiness about accommodations for the increased number of exhibits over last year, and from sheer necessity trucks may be thrown into the background in order to provide sufficient room for display of the even more popular motor vehicle.

Outsiders Excluded. Last year the association allotted considerable space to Portland distributors, but the number of Marion and Polk county dealers has increased to such an extent that the metropolis has this year been barred and the show given over entirely to local talent. And instead of the spacious armory floor being dotted here and there with an automobile display, as was the case last year. every available foot of room will be occupied by 1920 creations of the automobile industry represented by home dealers.

But the motor enthusiast who anicipates revolutionary tendencies in automobiles will be disappointed, for, on the whole, the Salem show must necessarily present only a continuance-with comparatively few changes-of models that have become standard during recent years. Even the tendency toward "loud" color effects, which have heretofore contributed to the picturesqueness of autemobile shows, will undoubtedly be somewhat curtailed, the majority of manufacturers and dealers preferring

Entertainment Provided. One thing is certain, as regards his particular show at least. Products which have been thoroughly experimented with by world's greatest engineers and pronounced complete will have place. Among these will be the closed car, the number of entries of these popular models emphasizing to a notable degree the trend of the present day.

The committee in charge of the Salem show has perfected arrangements for entertainment both afternoons and evenings. A musical program by the Steelhammer orchestra is one of the leading features. A considerable sum has been set aside for decorating the interior of the building, and visitors will find something new and artistic along this
