

VEGETABLES TO BE CANNED BY HUNT COMPANY

Spinach, Green Beans and
Pumpkins Will Re Empha-
sized This Season

CAPACITY IS DOUBLED

Large Pack of Strawberries Is
Included in Program,
Firm Announces

Vegetables as well as fruit will be
canned by the Hunt Brothers com-
pany during the coming season.

Some packing of vegetables was done
last year, but, because of the increase
in capacity due to the large addition
to their plant now under construction,
the firm has decided to can
spinach, green beans and pumpkins.
Whether any other vegetables will be
added to these products will be
decided later.

Packing strawberries and goose-
berries was begun last year on May
31. This year spinach will be added
to the first pack and it is expected
the offerings will be of sufficiently
large bulk to start the cannery at
nearly full capacity. A little later
as the movement of both fruit and
vegetables shall increase the new can-
nery now being erected and which
will double the capacity will be put
into operation. The company will
then be in position to take care of
about all the products in its line that
fruit and vegetable growers may
have to offer.

The plan is to put up a large pack
of strawberries. The varieties pre-
ferred are Wilsons, Trebias and El-
terberg. These are rated best for

canning because they remain firm
during processing. But not nearly
enough of these varieties are grown
in this section to supply the require-
ments. This year, in order to in-
crease its supply of this popular
fruit, the firm will can the variety
known as the Oregon strawberry.
This berry is recognized by consum-
ers as having no superior in size
and quality as well as yield. The
only trouble with the Oregon berry
the packers say, is that it is not
quite firm enough for a packer.

ent growers of the Oregon berry to
learn that the Hunt Brothers will
can all the Oregon strawberries this
year that they can purchase.

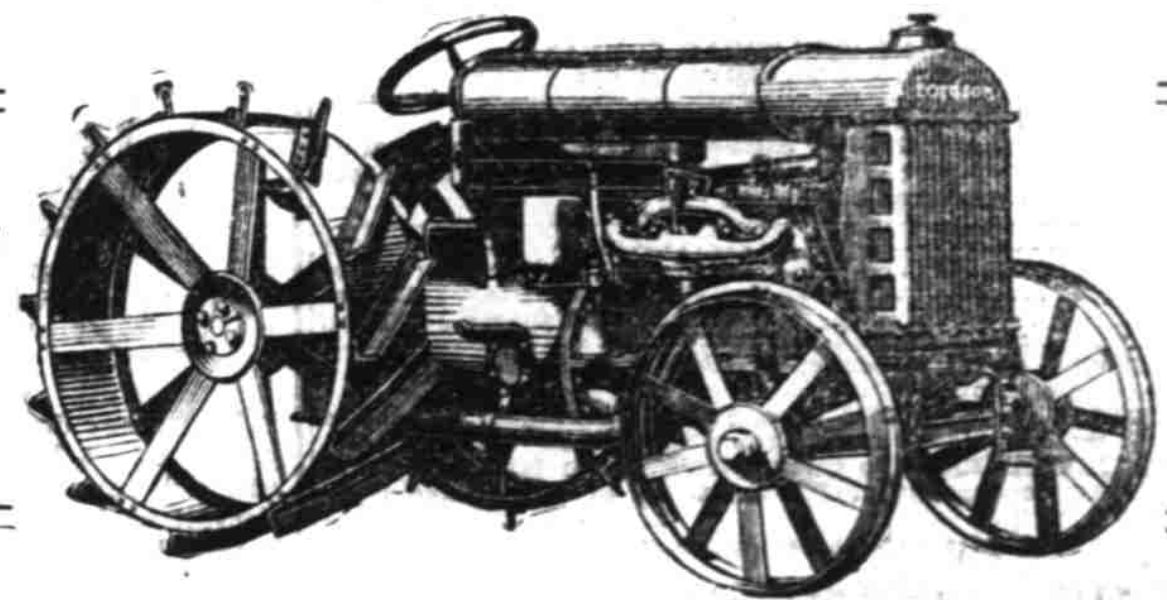
Boy Scouts Halt Work Until Others Show Lull
