CITY BRIDGES TO BE PAINTED

All Are to Receive Coats of White, Says Street Commissioner Low

One coat of paint has been applied and the second will be administered as soon as the other dries. Mr. Low says this excellent weather should be an incentive to all residents of Salem to begin the spring improvements, the parkings next to the street should be cleaned, the old vacant lots that are filled with weeds and the winter's collection of waste, should be cleared and the waste removed.

Mr. Low said it was up to the citizens to make the first move but if they did not respond drastic action would have to be resorted to. If we begin early to clean up the unkempt parkings and lots, the spring tourists will have an opportunity to realize what a pretty little city Salem is," said Mr. Low. He is spending all his spare time trying to remove the "gray" impression put on the county by the winter.

Petition Aimed at Six Percent Tax Limit Drawn

PORTLAND, Feb. 14.—Attorney Lionel C. Mackay of the City's legal department is preparing the papers for an initiative petition for a law to remove the 6 per cent limitation from the state statute books. The measure will go on the ballot at the spring elections. The limitation measure as it now stands forbids the amount of taxation to increase in excess of 6 per cent a year.
