Tracks Are Repaired—Damage which was done to the Oregon Electric road bed by the severe frosts of the past season is now very nearly repaired. The tracks along High street have torn up for some time but the work is now very near completion and awaits only the application of concrete which will be used to solidify the work already done.

Water Right Sought—Charles J. Schnable, of Portland, has filed application with Percy Cupper, state engineer, for the appropriation of 600 second feet of water from the Santiam river for power purposes. It is proposed by Mr. Schnable to develop 6511 horse-power, practically all of which he says will be used in generating electricity. The proposed development, according to the application, will represent an expenditure of approximately \$800,000.
