**Shell Company Pays**—The statement of the Shell Company of California of the number of gallons of motor vehicle fuel sold

in the state of Oregon during the month of January, 1920, shows the sale of 97,301 gallons of gasoline and 1,939 gallons of distillate, on which the total tax of one cent per gallon on gasoline and one-half cent per gallon on distillate amounted to \$982.66.

**Power Development Asked**—An application for the development of power on the Willamette river has been filed with the secretary of the water board here by A. J. McInturff & Son of Enterprise. This development contemplates the appropriation of 100 second feet of the waters of the Willamette river above Willamette lake for the development of 682 horse-power, and the estimated cost of the improvement is \$57,000.

**Multnomah Man Files**—D. C. Lewis, representative from Multnomah county, yesterday filed with the secretary of state his declaration to become a candidate for state senator of Multnomah county at the Republican primary election to be held in May. Representative Lewis sets out in his declaration that he favors legislation restoring the state and nation to normal conditions and would support any legitimate measure which has for its purpose the curbing of the profiteer and the lowering of living costs. Mr. Lewis asks that the following be printed after his name: "I will do right."

**Water Rights Sought**—J. C. Stevens of Portland has filed application with the state engineer here for the appropriation of 5000 second feet of water from Deschutes river for the development of 60,000 horse-power. The development contemplates the construction of a concrete dam 115 feet high and 889 feet long, and a canal about 600 feet in length.

**Portland Lawyer Here**—W. P. Lord, well known practicing attorney of Portland, was here yesterday representing H. C. Holmes, who some time ago instituted an action to restrain the fish and game

The plaintiff asks for \$710.10 as judgment and costs of the court action.

**More Influenza Reported**—Reports from the state hospital for the insane indicate that several patients there were stricken with the influenza yesterday. Fifty cases had been reported previously. A strict quarantine has been established and as yet there have been no deaths.

**Guardianship Closed**—Samuel Brown, guardian of Gertrude Brown, was released from further charges of his guardianship by an order of the county court yesterday. It was shown to the court that the ward had attained the age of majority and was legally able to care for her own property. An estate of \$1500 was turned over to her by her guardian.

**Alleges Misrepresentation**—F. W. Gaines filed suit against S. C. Mills and Florence Mills in the circuit court yesterday, alleging that the defendants had misrepresented a piece of property that was purchased from them. According to the complaint the defendant bought a hotel from the defendants for the sum of \$1500 upon representations that the establishment was netting \$25 a week above expenses and was a more profitable investment than a \$5000 farm. The plaintiff claims that these statements were untrue and asks the court for judgment of \$1500 and costs.

**Divorce Is Sought**—An amended complaint was filed with the circuit court yesterday by Susie May Hanson, who is seeking a divorce from her husband, E. P. Hanson. The amended complaint sets out that the couple were married in Salem April 11, 1916. There are no children or property rights involved. The divorce action is based on the alleged fact that Hanson deserted her about July 11, 1916. The plaintiff asks a decree of divorce and such other relief as the court deems advisable.

**Machine Ditched**—Henry Schott, 850 E street, reported to the police yesterday that there was an auto in the ditch between D and E streets on Winter street, and that it had been there overnight. After investigation the police learned that the owner of the car had skidded into the ditch to avoid a collision with a truck and that, because of the mire he was unable to move the machine until morning.
