Wasco Bank Organized.—The Wasco County bank has filed articles of incorporation in the state banking department. The incorporators are Geo. C. Blakeley, of The Dalles; H. C. Dodds, of Dufur, and T. H. West and R. L. Stevens of Portland, and the capital stock is \$100,000. The bank will be located at The Dalles.

Irrigation Work Starts.—Directors and secretary of the North Unit Irrigation district conferred here yesterday with Percy Cupper, state engineer, with regard to starting development of the project. The district contains 100,000 acres of land, and bonds in the sum of \$5,000,000 have been voted for improvement work. These bonds were recently held to be valid by the supreme court, thereby making it possible for the district to proceed with construction work as soon as the money is available. The

irrigation district is a part of the Deschutes project, and is one of the largest undertakings of its kind launched in the state.

Hawkins and Lem Foster. Promulgation of the gospel is the purpose of the corporation. The Anderson Burgess Lumber company, of Eugene, has been incorporated with a capital stock of \$5000.
