Teacher Hearing Set.

The case of Eugenia H. Taggart in which she asks for reinstatement as a teacher in the schools of district No. 1, Portland, and approximately \$180 back salary and interest has been set for hearing before the supreme court here on March 16. The case was originally tried before Judge Tucker, with the result that judgment was awarded to the plaintiff. The school district through Clerk Thomas, then appealed to the supreme court for final determination of the action.

State Treasurer Hoff has increased the appraisal of the estate of C. O. Bigelow, who died recently in Josephine county, from \$20,713 to \$40,713. Because of this increase the heirs of the estate will be obliged to pay inheritance tax in the sum of \$475, or approximately \$150 more than based on the original appraisal.

Remick Estate Lifted.

Appraisal of the estate of Jesse C. Remick, who died in Portland on April 7, 1919, has been increased from \$138,598.77 to \$277,130.79, according to a report filed in the inheritance tax department here today. As a result of the increase the heirs to the estate will be obliged to pay to the state the sum of \$3468.19, or \$2541.95 more than based on the original appraisal.
