

be found in the trees. "This sour-sap condition is menerally accompanied by a reddish discororation under the bark and in the

sap wood," said the professor.

"This seems to save the structure of the tree from breaking down and exploding, so to speak, and may save many a tree that is in bad condition. "However, if the bark of the tree is all loose, we would warn against splitting the bark. One can easily determine whether any of the bark is loose by taking the handle of a knife and tapping the bark gently. "Loose bark always gives a hol-
