Objections of Treasury De-
partment Are Eliminated
By New Bill

Because of objections of the United
States treasury department to the
bill fostered by the Western States
Reclamation association for the is-
surance of bonds to raise \$250,000-
000 for reclamation purposes, Sen-
ator McNary has introduced a sub-
stitute bill which, it is understood,
will be satisfactory to that depart-
ment. Percy A. Cupper, state engi-
neer, was so informed in a letter
from Senator McNary yesterday.

The new McNary bill also provides
for a fund of \$250,000,000 for rec-
lamation purposes. But it calls for
the expenditure of \$15,000,000 an-
nually direct from the federal treas-
ury unless the funds become ex-
hausted when bonds would be is-
sued. The measure provides for co-
operation among states, districts,
counties and the federal govern-
ment.
