WILL BE SHOWN
SUNDAY NIGHT
Breaking of Caste System and Triumph of Christianity Depicted
LOCAL TALENT TO HELP
Churches of City to Dispense With Services So Members May Attend

The India Mass Movement pageant showing how the caste system is being broken down and whole villages under the leadership of their mayors are receiving Christian baptism, will be presented in dramatic form Sunday evening March 7, at 7:30 o'clock in the armory. The pageant will be directed by Rev. M. E. Osborn and Rev. C. C. Hermann, both of whom have served as missionaries in India for a number of years and are intimately acquainted with exotic features of that country.

The production will be a presentation of the astounding movement of the native masses of India toward Christianity, with a setting of the native life, modes of dress, customs and superstitions of the people. The Raja Yisu Aya song, which has had a tremendous influence in the Christianization of India, will be sung in the vernacular by the players in costume grouped about the village Chaudhri, and there will be added touches which the directors themselves are able to give because of their intimate knowledge of the manners and habits of the people of India.
