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OREGON FAIR LOSES SUPPORT OF JERSEY MEN

Club Withdraws Premium
Money and Gives All Donations to Portland

OFFICIALS ARE AROUSED

Effort Being Made to Bring
Back Patronage of Jersey
Breeders

Secretary A. H. Lea of the state fair board and prominent Oregon Jersey cattle breeders, including Representative C. N. McArthur, are aroused over action of the American Jersey Cattle club in withdrawing its support in premium contributions from the state fair and transferring it wholly to the Pacific International Livestock show at Portland. This action of the club became known here yesterday outside of official circles.

At the same time the American Jersey Cattle club has likewise withdrawn its support in premium contribution from the Washington and Idaho state fairs. Secretary Lea and Representative McArthur are working hard to bring back the club to the state fair.

While the amount of money contributed in premiums to the state fair is not large, only \$140, it is important as representing the club's annual support which is now withdrawn. A like amount has been contributed to the Washington fair and a smaller amount to the Idaho fair. In lieu of these contributions the club has agreed to contribute \$1000 to the Portland show for this year.

"It may be interpreted as one of those moves to establish a larger dairy show at the Portland exposition than at the state fair," said Secretary Lea. "But this cannot be done. It never has been done and never will be done."

Brown Says Herd Law Not Constitutional

The herd law passed by the 1919 session of the legislature applying only to Umatilla county and prohibiting livestock from running at large is utterly unconstitutional for the reason that it is purely a local measure, declares an opinion of Attorney General Brown written for R. L. Keator, Umatilla county district attorney.

The act when passed by the legislature was referred to the people at the special election of June, 1919, and passed. Mr. Keator asks whether the vote of the people had the

effect of validating the measure if it was unconstitutional at the time it was referred by the legislative body. Brown replies in the negative.

Another question asked by Mr. Keator is whether the law applies to the Umatilla Indian reservation and to national forests in Umatilla county. Mr. Brown answers in the affirmative.

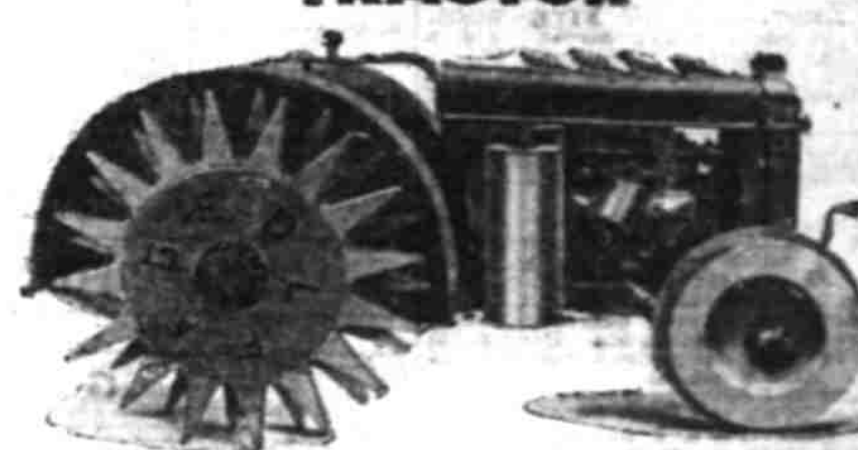
Foster for Second Time Quits State Institution
