Hospital Overtaxed—

With 1796 patients under care at the state hospital for the insane, the population record at that institution is broken and the number is in excess of the normal capacity of the hospital. Dr. R. E. Lee Steiner, superintendent, says that counting employees, more than 2000 persons are now housed at the hospital.

Milo George Escapes—

Milo George, who was committed to the state hospital for the insane from Newberg about three years ago, escaped from one of the convalescent wards of the institution yesterday. He had been ill. The authorities ascertained that George had gone in an easterly direction from Salem and several men are searching for him.
