CONKLIN RAPS TABLE RAPPERS AND MEDIUMS

University Professor Refuses to Defend Mystic Creed of Spiritism

LOCAL FAKE IS EXPOSED

Educator Certain There Is Future Life, But Denies Communication

Spiritualists need not look to Dr. Edmund S. Conklin, of the University of Oregon, either to advocate or defend their mystic creed. He stated distinctly last night that he does not have any patience with those who represent themselves as mediums and who, by their deft art, extract shekels from the credulous and unsuspecting.

Dr. Conklin delivered a very entertaining address in the auditorium of the public library. While speaking on the subject, "The Revival of Modern Spiritualism," he incidentally related that, a few days ago, a well known man came to Salem from Portland to consult a medium located in this city.

The unsuspecting man had in his overcoat pocket a letter from his uncle residing in England. The coat was hung in the hallway.

The woman absented herself from the parlor a few minutes, secured the letter, and, after reading it carefully, returned to the parlor, went into a pretended trance; when, to the astonishment of the Portland man, the medium related many interesting facts about his English uncle.

"Nearly every one has seen or heard spooks, ghosts, goblins and other apparent supernatural manifestations at some time in his life," said the speaker, "many have felt convinced that such sights or experiences were due to the return of departed ones from the spirit world."

"In about every such instance where the cold light of science had been turned on the apparent phenomenon a rational explanation of its occurrence was given."

Dr. Conklin stated frankly that the mysteries of the occult had, as believers, such great minds as Caesar, Napoleon, Bacon and even Garfield. He does not believe in telepathy as being able to perform the remarkable feats of communication of one mind with another though separated by great distance. Spirit-rappings, ouija boards, tilting tables and all such devices were cast into the discard as not entitled to serious discussion.

Answering the old, old question, "When we die shall we live again?" the speaker said the answer was unquestionably in the affirmative. This belief, he said, has existed in man's consciousness and through intuition he has never wondered far from his faith in the reality of a future life. It is the effort of the intellect, he said, to give a concrete explanation of this intuitive belief in a life after death that has given rise to so much fake occult teachings.

years ago at the head of the department of public speaking, you have strengthened their enrollment, you have sought to build permanent foundations, and you have been devoted to your work. Personally and in behalf of the university I thank you. I trust that your release from the heavy burdens will enable you to take a complete rest and that your strength will be speedily restored.

"Her department has been one of the most popular in the university because the students have recognized in Professor Miller one who not only had a thorough understanding of her work but one who lives in a house by the side of the road and is a friend to man. She was the special friend of the week and the unpopular student."

"Professor Miller as an educator is in the front ranks of her profession. Her methods are fundamental and modern, and Willamette university is fortunate to have retained her services for their past two and a half years."

"Yesterday afternoon Dr. Doney notified Orville Crowder-Miller, the son of Professor Miller, that he had been elected to succeed her as head of the public speaking department of Willamette university. Mr. Miller is a graduate of the School of Expression, Boston, and was head of the department of public speaking of Elon college, North Carolina, previous to his coming to Willamette. During their past year he has been one of the two assistants to Profes-

or Miller, the other being Horace Rabskopf, who will also continue his work with the new head of the department. It is expected that the excellent work which has been done by Prof. Della Crowder-Miller will be carried on by the new head of the department with less interruption than by any other provision.
