Will Organize Local Alumni— Preliminary steps were taken last night at the Salem Commercial club to organize a local Alumni association of the graduates and ex-students of the University of Oregon. W. C. Winslow is one of the leaders of the movement. Committees were selected to arrange a constitution and by-laws and the actual organization will probably be effected soon. The next meeting is planned for Tuesday night at 7 o'clock.

Many Bicycles Stolen— About two dozen bicycles have been stolen in Salem during the past six weeks, according to the reports to the police for that time. Police believe the petty thefts are the result of organized work, or a number of separate parties that take the bicycles only to ride them home or along the street and then discard them in some secluded place or leave them standing in the street. The parties implicated in the thefts are said to be known to the police and will be arrested if the reports of the missing wheels continue to

pour into police headquarters, according to Chief of Police Welsh. The high school and the Y. M. C. A. and public library have been the favorite places selected by the thieves.

Lubki Wants Divorce— William Lubki, alleging desertion, filed suit in the circuit court yesterday for a divorce from his wife, Maria Lubki. According to the complaint, the couple were married at Crown Point, Ind., May 11, 1914. Mr. Lubki claims that in August of 1915 his wife deserted him and has since lived away and apart from him.

Rewards Are Offered— Rewards of \$5 each are offered for information leading to the whereabouts of Garland Brooks and James Taylor, two 18-year-old boys who ran away a few days ago from the state training school. Brooks was sent to the institution from Hillsboro and Taylor from Oregon City. Salem police and the office of Sheriff Needham are assisting in the effort to locate the lads.

Whiteman Funeral Monday— The funeral of Mrs. Sarah J. Whiteman, a resident of Salem for the past 13 years, who died Thursday, will be held Monday at 2 p. m. from the Rigdon chapel, with Rev. H. N. Aldrich officiating. Burial will follow in City View cemetery. Mrs. Whiteman had been ill for several months with paralysis and was 32 years old. Her husband died in 1887, seven years ago. She is

survived by one sister, Mrs. C. Wright, of Eatonville, Wash., and by one brother, W. R. Davis, of Independence.
