Tuesday evening the pictures are scheduled to be shown at Livesley school, Wednesday at Pringle, Thursday at Middlegrove, Friday at Kelzer and Saturday at Salem Heights school. The object of the program at the schools is to arouse the interest of the parents in industrial club activities. Since the introduction of club work the interest of the students has increased rapidly each year.

In accordance with previous announcements, the delightfully refreshing fairy-tale comedy, "My Sunshine Lady," the latest contribution from the successful workshop of LeComte and Fletcher, on its first road tour, comes to the Grand Opera house Sat. Patrick's day on Wednesday, March 17.

The story of the play carries two daintily threaded themes, an old man's super-expressive adoration for his winsome, prettily budding orphaned grand-daughter, and the silent, warm love of another worshiper at her shrine, a wealthy, healthy young American who chooses to conceal his identity as her benefactor, and win her love with his individual character appeal.

Therewith the romantic plot is hatched—a scheme just about as practical as any successful present day farce author would be permitted to exploit and quite as dire as any popular personnel of modern musical comedies could be expected to explode, however. The wit and played and constantly complicated it runs throughout the five happy scenes.

The opening scene is laid in a quaint old fishing town of Brittany. The home of "Babette" and her aged grandfather, "Pere Louis," who is but recently reduced to distressed circumstances. Our young American, "Dick Morgan," escorted by his tourist party, hits upon the brilliant plan and right joyfully is abetted by his sister "Rhoda"; his cousin, "Tillie"; his brother-in-law, "Norman"; and his genius brother Dick and assigns a part and all accept eagerly, the allotments that promise so novel a lark. From this point the complications begin, each of the faithful accomplices play their parts and all become entangled so hopelessly in the meshes of the boomerang action, that in the end, unsophisticated "Babette"—the intended victim—comes laughingly to the rescue, unwinding the troublesome skeins by explaining her own little counter-plot that created all the mess, then, rue to the fairy prophecy of grandpere "Louis," she married "Dick" the man she loves, just as the clock strikes one.

GIRL RESERVES ARE ORGANIZED IN THIS CITY

Movement Teaching High Ideals Reaches Salem Through Miss Gamble

CODE IS SET FORTH

Preparations Are Made for Annual Conference To Be Held Near Eugene

Benefiting the "teen age" girl directly is the Girl Reserves. "The Blue Triangle Girls of the Y. W. C. A." the organization of which was tentatively begun in the Y. W. C. A. rooms yesterday afternoon.

Miss Gula Gamble, girls work secretary of the northwestern field with headquarters in Seattle was present, outlining the work.

Miss Gamble met the women of the city yesterday, but this afternoon and tomorrow will meet the girls of the city.

The Reserve plan includes three programs aimed to reach three groups of girls: Those of the grade schools, junior high, high schools and young business girls. The unit of the organization is a corps made up of ten to twenty girls under the direction of an advisor. Two or more corps make up a company, all companies and corps in the community making up a division.

Trains Girls While Young
The object of the movement is to give girls through normal natural activities, the habits, insight and ideals of which will make them responsible women, capable and ready to make America more true to its best hopes and traditions. Girls between 12 and 18 may join the Reserve.

No girl can be a member outside of the Y. W. C. A. The honor system prevails in the grade and junior high school programs, the high school program being similar to those of the Y. W. C. A. in colleges and universities. The business girls' program features recreational activities.

The annual conference of the Reserve will be held this year near Eugene.

Strong in Northwest
In the United States are 60,000 Girl Reserves and about 5,000 in the northwest. Various countries of the world are asking for programs. Many Reserves already being established in various parts of the earth. For a uniform the girls wear white middie, and dark skirts, with white skirts for dress occasions. Arm bands with chevrons designate the ranks.

The slogan of the Reserve is "To face life squarely." Their purpose, "To find and give the best," and their code, "As a girl Reserve I will be Gracious in manner Impartial in judgment Ready for service Loyal to friends Reaching toward the best Earnest in purpose Seeing the beautiful Eager for knowledge Reverent to God Victorious over self Ever dependable Sincere at all times."
