POLITICAL GOSSIP OF STATE AND LOCALITY

M'ARTHUR AND KOZER LISTED

Two Candidates for Congress, One for Secretary of State File

One candidate for congress from the second district, one congressional candidate from the third district and one aspirant for secretary of state, all Republicans, filed their declarations at the secretary of state's office yesterday.

Owen F. Jones of Baker announces his candidacy for representative in congress, and for the nomination by the Republican party will be in opposition to N. J. Sinnott, incumbent. C. N. McArthur of Portland, present representative of the third district in congress, filed yesterday and Sam A. Koser officially declared himself a candidate for secretary of state.

"Will advocate legislation in the interests of all the people," says Mr. Jones of Baker in his platform, "with due regard to the equal rights of capital, labor and the general public, and will give every encouragement for the development of the natural resources of the state of Oregon to the end that they may be enjoyed by the greatest number. My earnest effort will be devoted to the end that Oregon may receive its just proportion for its own improvement, of the funds derived by the government from Oregon's resources."

Mr. McArthur declares that he "will continue to discharge my duties to the best of my ability and to keep in mind the welfare of my country, its institutions and all of its people. I will continue to oppose bumbling and demagoguery, and the schemes of those groups and factions who wish to subvert the government to their own selfish purposes."

In his platform Mr. Koser calls attention to his long service for the state and his intimacy with public affairs and says that as a member of the state board of control passing upon important public matters "I shall always have in mind the fact that I am acting in the capacity of a trustee of the people's interests."

Otto D. Drain of Portland filed as a candidate for delegate to the national Democratic convention.

George A. Gore of St. Helens has filed as a candidate for district attorney for Columbia county.

Pierce Seeks Re-Election.

Information has reached Salem that Walter M. Pierce, who has represented Union county in the state senate at several sessions of the legislature, will seek re-election. Senator Pierce is the author of much constructive legislation, including the market road bill. He was joint author with Senator I. S. Smith of Coos and Curry counties of the educational aid act for soldiers, sailors and marines.

Harry Levy, local retailer, of the Midget Market claims that the program of buying cheaper meat is meant for the larger cities. The sales of the Salem markets, he says, are mostly confined to the lower priced cuts. He says that many times he has sold out all the beef steak and like kinds of meat and has had to sell the choice cuts for the price of the cheaper meat. In many instances it is a saving to ship the lesser priced meats in from Portland on account of the wholesale

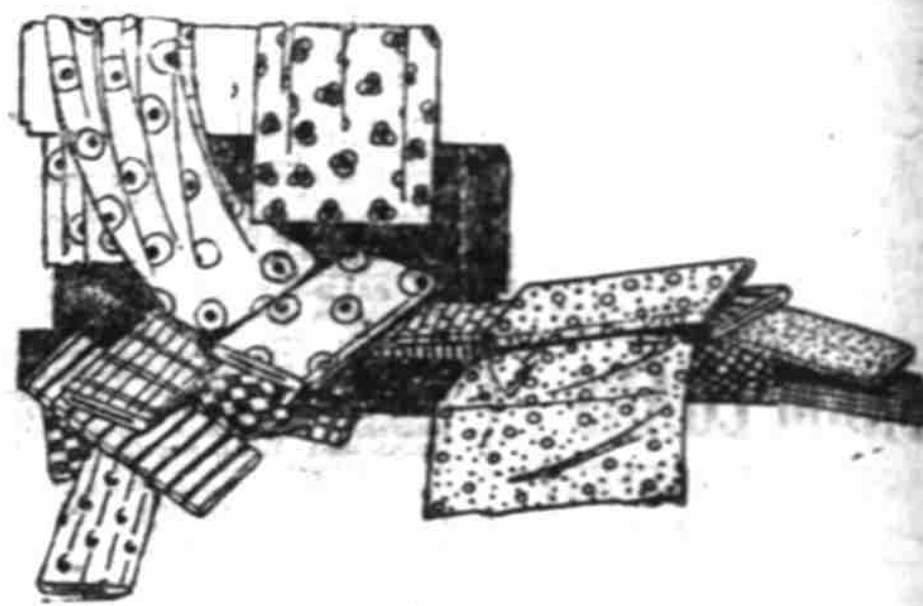
