Bennett, state superintendent of banks. Compared with the call of March 4, 1919, the increase is \$23,709,907.51. Since November 17, 1919, however, there has been a decrease of \$20,205,974.25.

President of Ireland Thanks God for U. S. Senate

NEW YORK, March 19.—Eamon De Valera, president of the "Republic of Ireland," announced today

that the adoption by the United States senate of a reservation to the peace treaty approving the principle of self-determination for the Irish people fulfilled his mission in this country.

The announcement was made in a cablegram to Arthur Griffith, acting president of the republic of Ireland, Mansion House, Dublin, which read:

"A te deum should be sung throughout all Ireland. We thank Almighty God
