Horses and Automobile Stolen From Hospital

A J. Gregg of the state tuberculosis hospital reported to the police Tuesday that two horses belonging to the hospital were missing. Dr. G. C. Belleuger, superintendent of the same institution reported yesterday that sometime during Tuesday night his automobile was taken from the garage. The police were later informed that the missing horses were found running loose near the hospital grounds. The sheriff's office was endeavoring to locate the missing car. Yesterday afternoon the auto was reported found at a farmhouse near Gaston, where it was claimed that two boys had left it for the night. Two boys of the state training school were working for the State Hospital and effected their escape about the same time the horses were missed and it was believed they may be responsible for the thefts. According to the latest reports yesterday the missing boys had not been located.

State and Cottage to Be Site for Filling Station

A permit for the erection of a filling station at State and Cottage streets was reissued to the Standard Oil Company by the city recorder's office yesterday. A few weeks ago the permit was obtained by the oil company to erect a station on the site but this was countermanded by the passing of a city ordinance prohibiting the erection of filling stations on sites outside the fire limits without the consent of all the property owners within 150 feet of the building location. The oil company acted according to the ordinance by obtaining consent of the property owners and will now erect a filling station at State and Cottage streets at a cost of \$2500.
